Introduction

Colombia: bird-richest country on earth!

The Coffee Region of Colombia, the Cauca Valley and the Pacific area are exceptional destinations for bird watching, attracting bird watchers and wildlife photographers from all over the world. The richness and diversity of birdlife found in this region is simply astonishing, and there are several compelling reasons to choose these destinations as your next birdwatching location.

First of all, the variety of birds you can find in this country is impressive. Colombia is the country with the highest bird biodiversity in the world, and these specific areas are known to host a large number of endemic and migratory species. From the majestic Andean Condor to the Multicolored Tanager, through colorful toucans and rare hummingbirds, there are birds for all tastes and levels of birdwatching experience. Each day of exploration will give you the opportunity to discover new species and capture unforgettable moments in your photographs.

In addition to the diversity of birds, these destinations offer a variety of unique ecosystems. The Coffee Region is famous for its lush coffee plantations, but is also home to cloud forests, paramos and wetlands, each of which is home to birds adapted to these particular conditions. In Valle del Cauca, you will find a mix of dry forests, wetlands and mangroves that attract tanagers and raptors. The Pacific region, with its humid rainforest and pristine beaches, is home to manakins, rainforest birds and many other unique species. At each location, the variety of habitats ensures an enriching and diverse birding experience.

The culture and hospitality of the local people are also highlights of these destinations. The inhabitants of these regions have a deep respect for nature and their environment, which translates into constant support for the conservation of biodiversity and a genuine interest in sharing their knowledge about local birds and fauna.

Last but not least, the Coffee Region of Colombia, the Cauca Valley and the Pacific offer a unique opportunity for lovers of nature photography. The golden light that bathes the coffee plantation landscapes at sunrise and sunset creates a magical atmosphere to capture impressive images of birds in their natural environment. The diversity of colors and shapes of birds in this region also ensures that each photograph is unique and special.

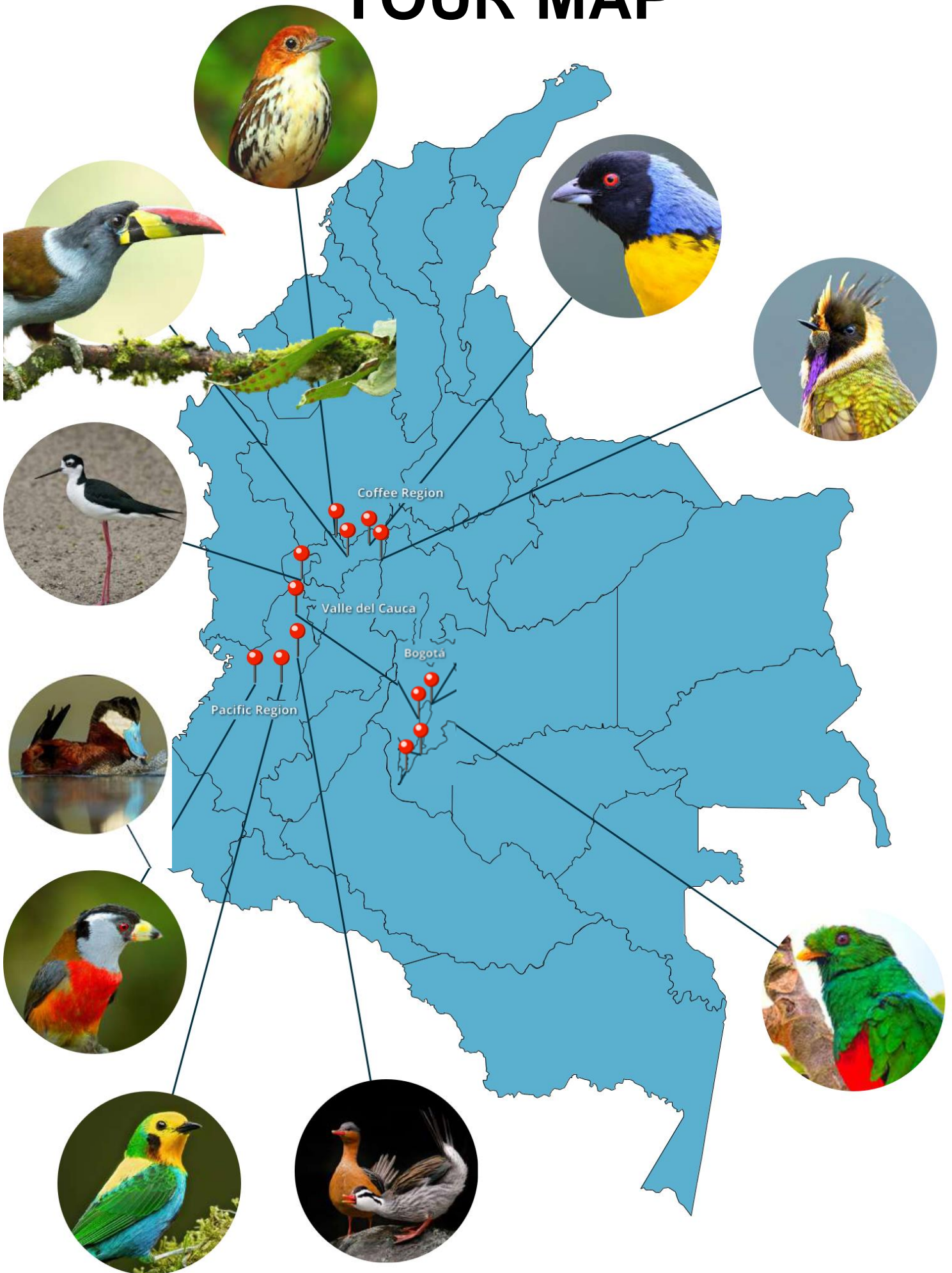
What to bring: Please travel light. Binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors (2-pin European style), strong insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, hat, rain poncho, travel umbrella, water bottle, hand sanitizer. Scopes, super-telephoto lenses that can only be used with tripods, and heavy suitcases are discouraged.

Clothing: Sturdy footwear recommended. Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt, over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary, including a rain-proof jacket. Quick-drying clothing for certain areas; warm clothes for the highlands. Neat casual attire for dinners. Shorts and sandals or thongs (flip-flops) acceptable for non-birding time.

Group size: Minimum 4, maximum 7 participants.

Cost: US\$8,899 per person including 2 domestic flights, transport & guiding during the tour, all meals, entry fees, accommodation based on double or twin-share occupancy. Single occupancy surcharge of \$690. Not included: international flights, laundry, drinks, activities or entry fees not stipulated in the itinerary, medical & other personal expenses, tips. Earlybird discount of \$99 for bookings received up to 12 months before departure date. Return-client discount may apply.

Pereira, Coffee Region

Early on Day 2, a short flight transports you to Pereira, the starting point of your birdwatching adventure. Upon arrival, a waiting driver will guide you to Rio Blanco, the inaugural stop of your tour. Here, amidst diverse ecosystems, you'll encounter a rich array of endemic and migratory birds.

Surrounded by the natural beauty of Rio Blanco, your birdwatching odyssey officially commences. Over the next fortnight, expert guides will lead you through various reserves, from cloud forests to tropical jungles, offering unique opportunities to spot and photograph a stunning variety of avian species. Each day unfolds as a new chapter in your exploration of Colombia's incredible birdlife, contributing to an unforgettable experience of nature's wonders.



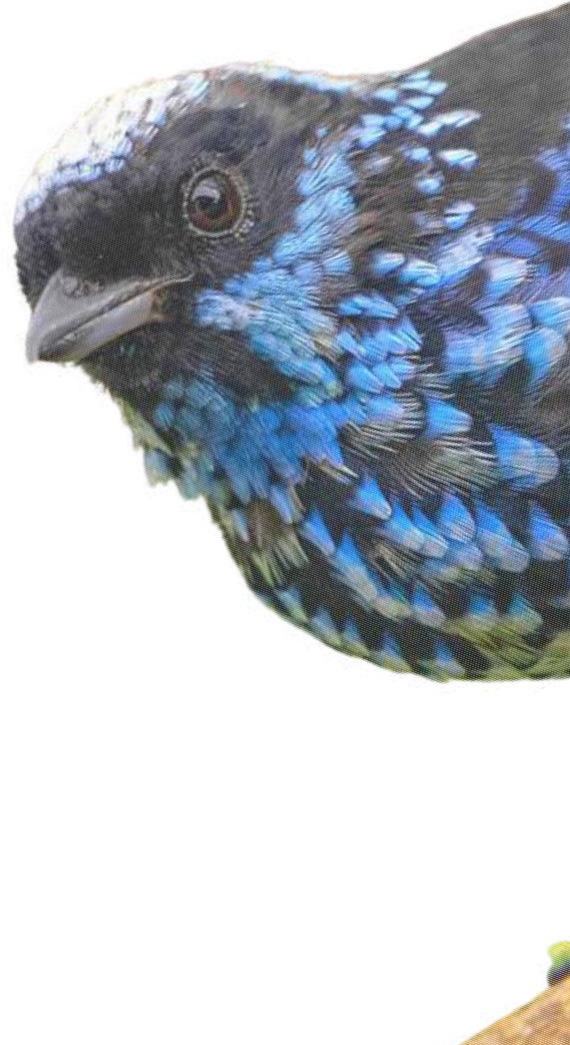
Day 2 (B,L,D)

Photographing Dream Birds

Rio Blanco Natural Reserve

Considered by the World Wildlife Fund as the epicenter of bird watching in Colombia, this reserve is an ornithological paradise. With 372 species of birds identified to date, with no less than 33 species of hummingbirds, every corner of this enchanted forest offers a unique opportunity to observe and photograph these winged beauties.

Entering the Río Blanco Natural Reserve is to immerse yourself in a world of plumage and varied songs. The Reserve is part of the Río Blanco and Quebrada Olivares Protective Forest Reserve, a vast area of 4,943 hectares that protects a unique natural treasure in Manizales.

Entering The Paramo



Finca Hacienda El Bosque

Hacienda El Bosque, located in Manizales, is a magnet for bird lovers. This historic family farm, located in Manizales, extends across altitudes between 2,800 and 3,900 meters above sea level. Its diverse ecosystems include grasslands, Andean forests and moors, all safeguarded for more than 40 years.

It is a renowned destination for birdwatching, with more than 293 recorded species, such as Grey-breasted Mountain Toucan, Rufous & Crescent-faced Antpitta, Barred Fruiteater, Purple-backed & Rainbow-bearded Thornbill, Sword-billed Hummingbird, Scarlet-bellied Mountain Tanager, Ocellated Tapaculo and Chestnut-breasted Chlorophonia. The cabins in the high Andean forest offer a unique experience to observe forest birdlife from your balcony.

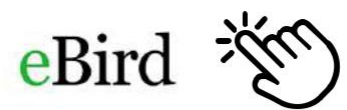

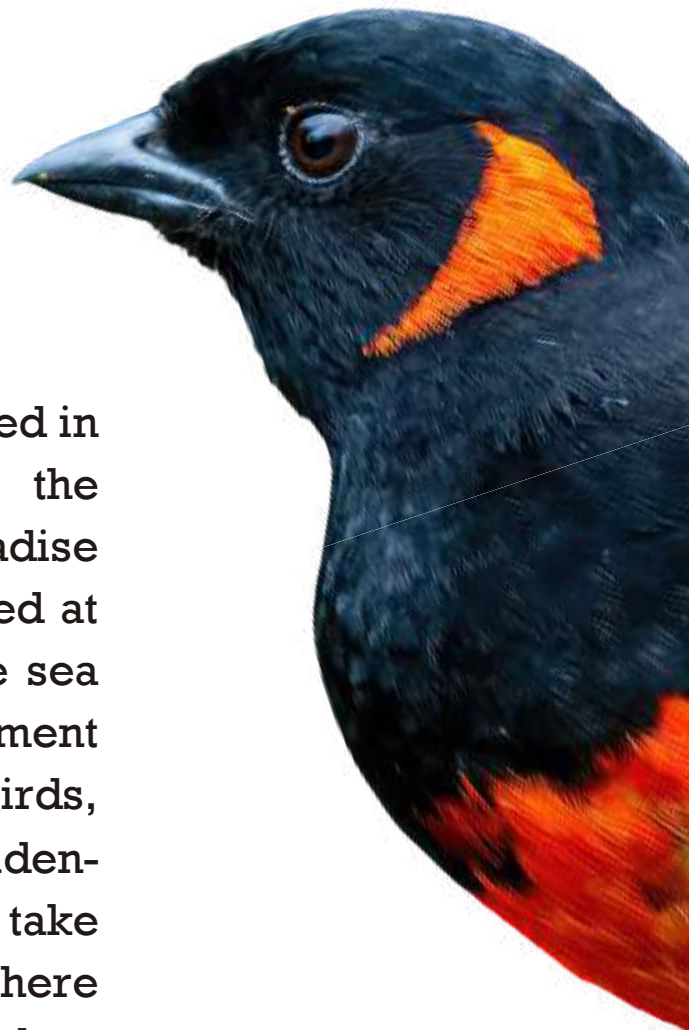

Central Andes birding & photography

Hotel Termales del Ruiz

The Hotel Termales del Ruiz, located in the impressive cloud forest of the Central Andes Mountains, is a paradise for lovers of bird watching. Located at an altitude of 2,850 meters above sea level, it offers a magical environment with more than 167 species of birds, such as Shining Sunbeam and Golden-fronted Whitestart. The trails will take you to waterfalls and springs, where you can enjoy the symphony of colors and bird sounds. In addition, the hotel provides comfort and charm with its services, such as hot springs and delicious meals. This natural sanctuary will connect you deeply with nature, leaving you with unforgettable wildlife memories.

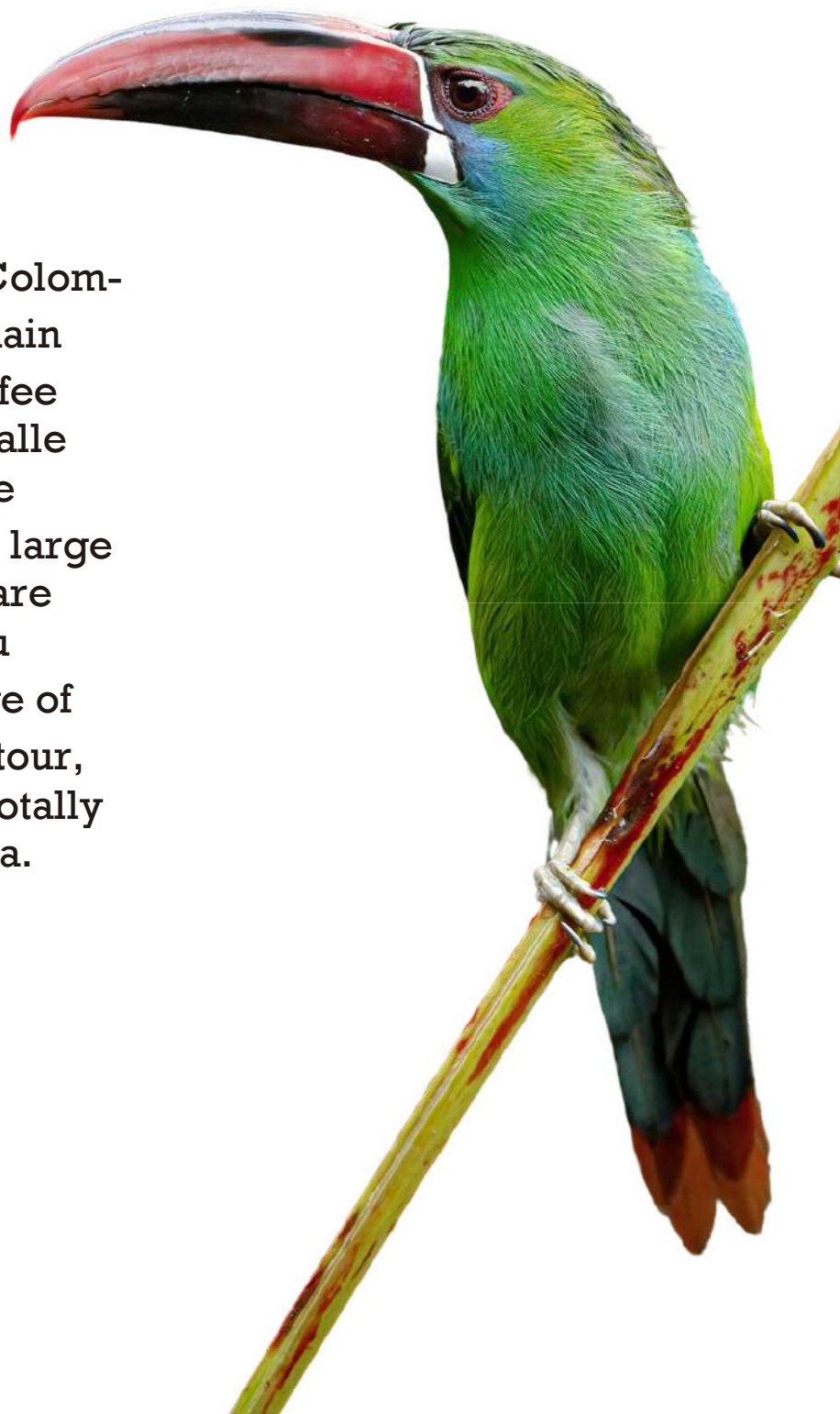

Day 6 (B,L,D)

Trip To Valle Del Cauca

Cali, Valle del Cauca

On your sixth day in Colombia, having visited the main Bird reserves in the Coffee Region, you will go to Valle del Cauca, located in the Western Andes where a large number of bird species are found. Interestingly, you will cover a wide range of ecosystems during this tour, therefore, you will see totally new species in each area.

Visiting The Valle Del Cauca Reserves

The Bird Forest

You will begin your tour of Valle del Cauca at the La Florida bird watching reserve, recognized for its outstanding opportunities for bird photography. Its hosts have built hides and to enable spectacular photographs of the otherwise hard-to-find birds, and visitors take away unique memories (and memory card!). It is also recognized for its great variety of bird species, since more than 330 have been recorded, with the highlight being the endemic Pied Tanager.

Walking Amongst Hummingbirds

San Felipe Birding & Finca Alejandria

San Felipe Bird Reserve is located in the cloud forest of Cali. In 2004, this region was declared by BirdLife International as an Important Bird Conservation Area (AICA/IBA). Due to its geographical location, the property is part of one of the most biologically important areas in southwest Colombia. In San Felipe you'll not spend a very special day observing or photographing a wide variety of birds local to the region, but also enjoy a magical and relaxing experience around a beautiful and natural reserve of 22 hectares, most of which is virgin forest.

Located nearby, Finca Alejandria "Hummingbird Paradise" is a unique experience for birders. This farm is a pioneer in bird watching in Colombia and it is one of the most important reserves in the country.



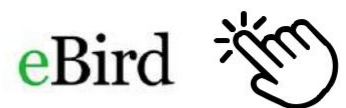

Approaching The Colombian Pacific

Finca Doña Dora



First thing in the morning we will go to the Doña Dora bird watching farm to spot the Andean Cock-of-the-Rock. This farm is recognized for the large number of species that inhabit it, making it the number one birding locality in the Valle del Cauca, with more than 500 observed species. Among the birds that we can observe in this place we find the famous and iconic Toucan Barbet (is it a toucan? Is it a barbet? It's both!), Cock of the Rock, the endemic Crested Ant-tanager, and even the glistening Emerald Tanager.

Birding in the Sonso Lagoon

With its lush wetland environment and diverse ecosystems, Laguna de Sonso is home to an extraordinary variety of bird species. From beautiful herons and elegant kingfishers to majestic eagles and captivating ducks, the lagoon is home to an abundance of migratory and resident birds, each one more fascinating than the last.

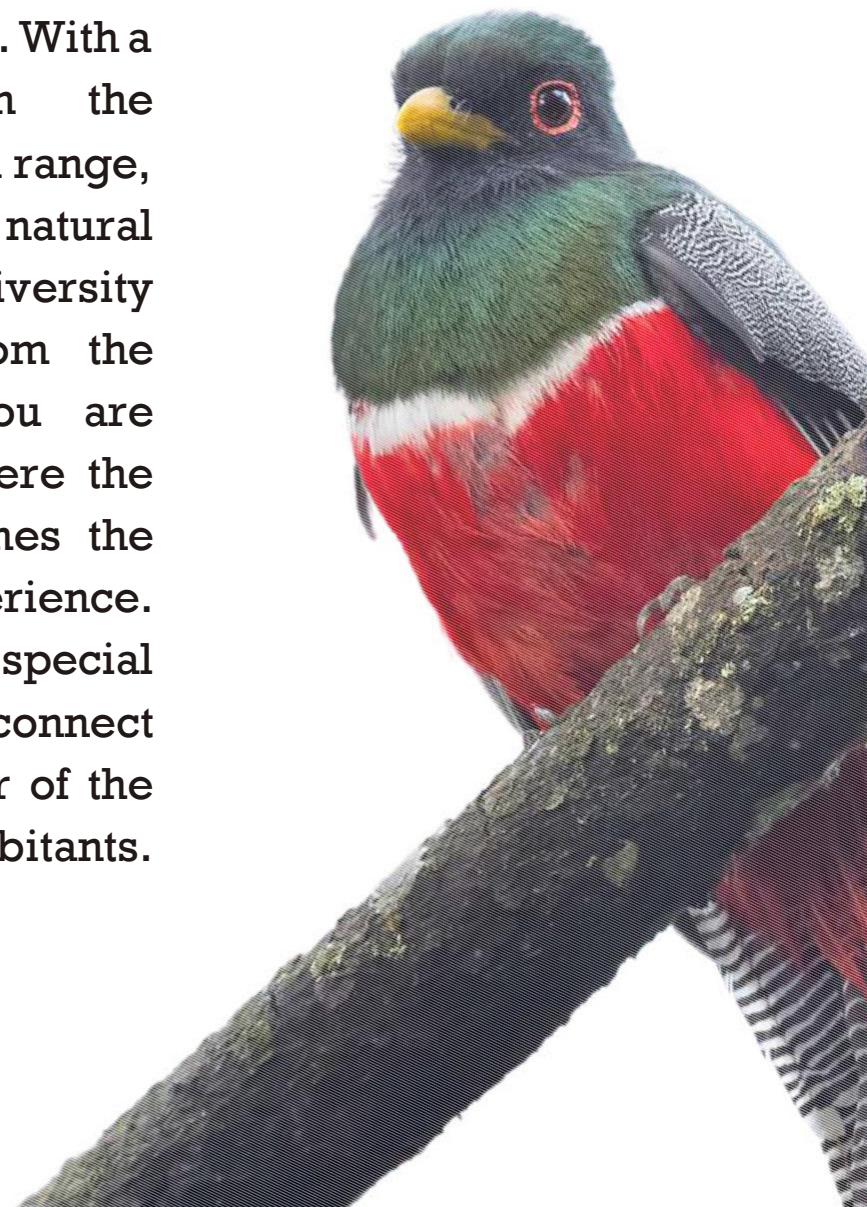
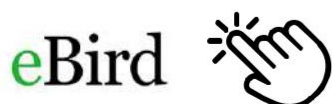

Touring The Central Andes

Curigua Ecolodge

Curigua Ecolodge is a true paradise for bird watchers. With a privileged location in the imposing central mountain range, it offers an exceptional natural environment where bird diversity is second to none. From the moment you arrive, you are immersed in a world where the song of the birds becomes the soundtrack of the experience. Every moment in this special place is designed to connect visitors with the grandeur of the Andes and its winged inhabitants.

Birding In Buga, Valle Del Cauca

Hacienda El Diamante

The Hacienda El Diamante is an ideal place to enjoy nature and watch birds in Buga, Valle del Cauca. Buga is a territory rich in biodiversity and has more than 300 recorded bird species. The Hotel Hacienda El Diamante is located between 1,000 and 2,700 meters above sea level, making it an ideal base to observe the area's rich birdlife.

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DAY 13 (B,L,D)

Recharging in Bogota

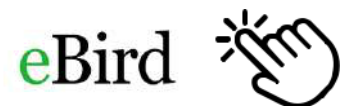
After some final birding around Hacienda El Diamante we return to Cali and take a flight to Bogota. Where we have a chance to recharge ourselves in our comfortable hotel, in preparation for our departure tomorrow morning to the well-known Observatorio de Colibríes La Calera, a dedicated sanctuary for the preservation of hummingbirds.

Walking amongst Hummingbirds

Observatorio de Colibríes



The Observatorio de Colibríes La Calera is a dedicated sanctuary for the preservation of hummingbirds. It actively contributes to their survival by planting a diversity of trees and flowers to attract more of these winged jewels. Hummingbird feeders are strategically placed in gardens and forests to provide a safe refuge, allowing them to escape contamination from nearby cropped, deforested areas.

This meticulous and joy-filled project took five months to establish, resulting in hummingbirds feeling comfortable in the gardens. Since then, these rainbow-colored creatures have made the observatory their safe haven for sustenance and reproduction. In 2013, the observatory opened its doors to the public, offering a unique opportunity to witness the vibrant spectacle of life and color gifted by these hummingbirds in gratitude.



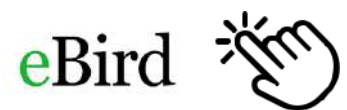




DAY 15 (B,L,D)

This day involves a more specialized immersion, where participants will have the chance to delve deeply into the specific habitat of this beautiful bird. With expert guides, they will venture into the world of tanagers and enjoy an enriching experience while observing and learning about these unique birds.

DAY 17 (B,L,D)

Hummingbirds in the Cerro Monserrate

The final day unfolds at Cerro Monserrate, an iconic location with a paramo trail that takes participants to higher altitudes in search of different species of hummingbirds. This day is dedicated to the wonderful diversity of hummingbirds that inhabit the Colombian mountains. Participants will immerse themselves in the energy of this paramo environment, marveling at the speed and colorful displays of these small jewels. The combination of altitude, unique flora, and the presence of hummingbirds creates an unforgettable day full of close encounters with these fascinating birds. At the end of the day we return to Bogota for final dinner.
