



Tasmania

1 - 8 February 2027

Australia's mysterious island state is home to 13 endemic birds as well as some unique mammal species. Our Tasmania: Birds & Mammals tour showcases these wonderful birding and mammal highlights in 5½ fabulous days. Bird species include Forty-spotted Pardalote, Dusky Robin, 3 Honeyeaters, Yellow Wattlebird, Tasmanian Native-Hen, Black Currawong, Green Rosella, Tasmanian Scrubwren, Tasmanian Thornbill and Scrubtit, as well as the beautiful Swift Parrot. Iconic mammals include Tasmanian Devil, Platypus

and Echidna. We'll be visiting enchanting fern glades, pristine and spectacular coasts, dense eucalypt forests, islands, streams and wetlands, and unique button-grass moors. Wonderful scenery, true wilderness, good food and excellent accommodation, often located within the various wilderness areas we'll be visiting, make this a tour not to be missed! The tour commences and ends in Hobart, and visits Bruny Island, Mt Wellington and Mt Field NP. Join us in 2027 for an unforgettable experience!

Itinerary

Day 0: 1 February 2027

Arrival in Hobart

Today has been set aside as an arrival day so you are free to arrive at any time that suits your travel plans. You are to make your own way to the hotel in the city (please see notes at the end of this itinerary) and we will meet at the hotel in the evening for a brief orientation and welcome dinner.

Overnight: Hobart, en-suite hotel rooms

Meals included: D

Day 1: 2 February 2027

Hobart reserves & Mount Wellington

After breakfast we bird local reserves around Hobart, which is situated on a steep rainfall gradient, ranging from averages of 500 mm to 1350 mm within only 25 km. This provides a wide variety of forest types, from grassy woodland to wet forests rich in ferns and mosses, and an opportunity to find a diverse array of birds including Tasmania's endemic species and see the differing habitat requirements of some of these localized, endemic bird species. We'll also head up to Mount Wellington. This mountain, at a height of 1270m (around 4,150 feet), affords spectacular views of the city and surrounding landscape on a clear day. Here we will also take a walk through a fern glade with towering tree ferns where we have another chance to see the rather shy Scrubtit as well as Tasmanian Scrubwren and the stunning Pink Robin. Further endemic highlights we find here include Green Rosella, Tasmanian Native Hen, Black Currawong and Yellow Wattlebird. At the end of the day, we drive north towards Mt Field National Park.

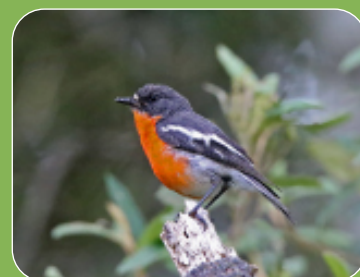
Overnight: Mount Field Retreat, en-suite cabins

Day 2: 3 February 2027

Hobart to Mount Field

We depart early to explore Mt Field with its natural wonders. At its base stand giant, 250-year-old gum trees, towering to 100 m tall, with a ground cover of mosses, ferns, lichens and fungi. As we ascend the winding road to the higher slopes, through an ever-changing succession of plant communities, the scenery changes from the soft greens of the rainforest to the harsh, glaciated landscape of the mountains, producing some spectacular scenic highlights. Among this myriad and density of vegetation we'll look for Pink Robin, Black Currawong and Yellow Wattlebird. We take several short walks and keep an eye out for

platypus, completing our day in the high alpine meadows searching for Striated Fieldwren and Flame Robin.

Overnight: Mt Field Retreat or similar, en-suite cabins
Meals included: B, L, D

Day 3: 4 February 2027

Mt Field to Bruny Island

After breakfast we drive back south and take a ferry to Bruny Island for our stay on the island. All twelve of Tasmania's endemic species are found on this scenic island: Tasmanian Native-hen, Green Rosella, Dusky Robin, Tasmanian Thornbill, Forty-spotted Pardalote, Tasmanian Scrubwren, Scrub-Tit, Yellow Wattlebird, Black Currawong, Strong-billed Honeyeater, Black-headed Honeyeater, and Yellow-throated Honeyeater.

Overnight: Bruny Hotel, en-suite hotel room

Day 4: 5 February 2027

Bruny Island

We will spend a full day birding on the island targeting the endemics and the non-endemics that are more abundant on Tasmania than on mainland Australia, including Hooded Plover, Brush Bronzewing, Swift Parrot, robins, Crescent Honeyeater and Forest Raven. Along the coast we should see Fairy Penguin, Black-faced Cormorant, Short-tailed Shearwater and other seabirds. We will visit a great little reserve with a very good chance of Forty-spotted Pardalote. At night we'll spotlight for marsupials such as Bennett's Wallaby, Tasmanian Pademelon, Long-nosed Potoroo & Eastern Quoll.

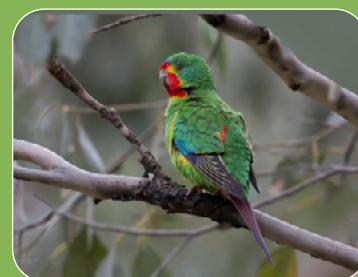

Day 5: 6 February 2027

Bruny Island to Hobart

The morning will be an opportunity to pick up anything we have missed on Bruny Island. Partway through the day we will take the ferry back to the mainland and for some final birding around Hobart. We will enjoy several short walks in reserves we haven't visited previously.

Day 6: 7 February 2027

Melaleuca

Today we take a spectacularly scenic flight to the remote South-West World Heritage area, the area named Melaleuca famed for its unspoilt wilderness, clean air and rare birdlife. We will have a chance to see one of the world's rarest birds, the critically endangered Orange-bellied Parrot. With no more than 100 left in the wild, this vivid parrot is teetering on the brink of extinction. Other specialties we hope to see are the elusive Ground Parrot, Striated Fieldwren, Black Currawong, the delightful Southern Emuwren and the Beautiful Firetail. Please note, the flight is weather dependent, and we will have limited opportunity to reschedule. Should the flight be cancelled, we'll explore the southern forests of the Tasman peninsula and visit the Tasmanian Devil rescue project at the "Unzoo". The cost of the flight will be refunded if cancelled.

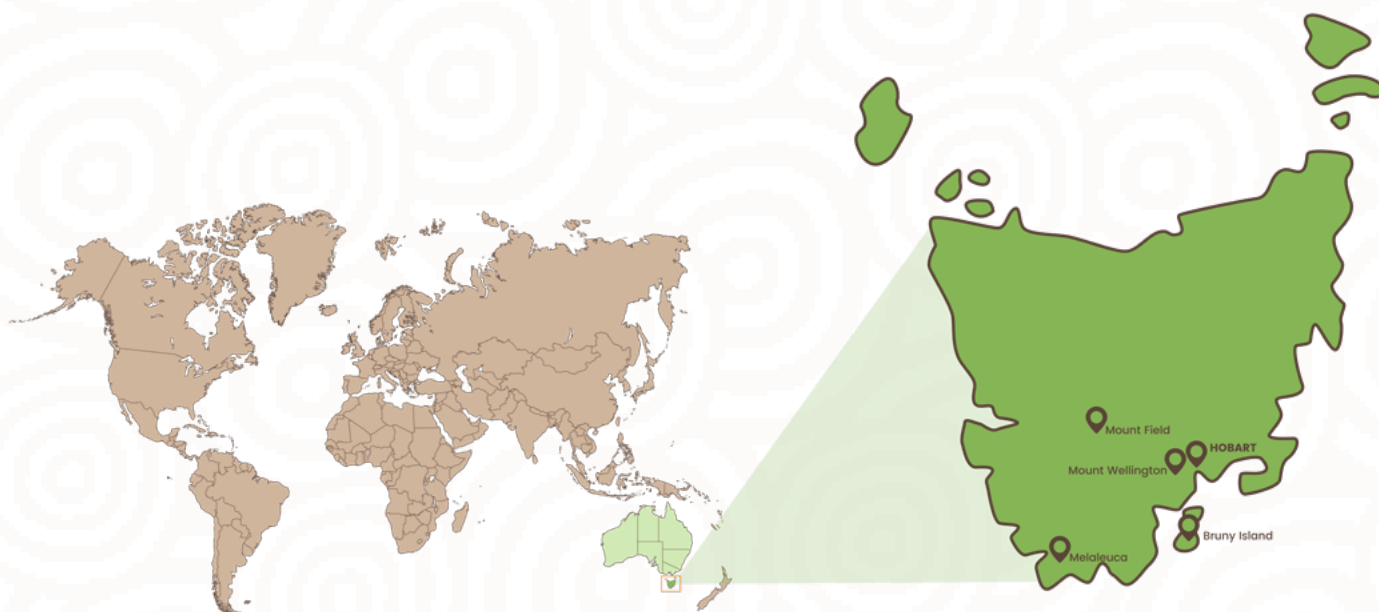

PRACTICAL DETAILS

IMPORTANT NOTES

- Arrival in Hobart: There is a regular shuttle bus service (The Hobart Airporter) between Hobart airport and the main hotels in the city. Details on the costs and timing of the shuttle can be found here: <http://www.airporterhobart.com.au/>. Alternatively, you may wish to take a taxi to the city. There is no need to pre-book these, they are readily available outside the terminal building. More information on taxis (and additional airport information) can be found here: <https://hobartairport.com.au/travellers/transport-and-parking/>.
- Meals: Breakfast: continental style (cereal, fruit, yoghurt and tea/coffee). Full cooked breakfast not usually available. Lunch: sandwiches/rolls/wraps, fruit, and a drink, often in the field; at times we may visit a bakery for lunch. Dinner: 2 courses (mains with the choice of either an appetiser or dessert). Drinks (soft and alcoholic) are not included but at lunches and breakfasts juice may be made available.

LEADERS

Bellbird leader.

DIFFICULTY

Low to medium level of fitness required. The tour has a relaxed pace, and walks are on varying surfaces, from paved roads to sandy or rocky walking trails with some short climbs. We generally walk slowly, with lots of stops. You can opt out of any challenging walks.

ACCOMMODATION

Private en-suite rooms in most hotels or lodges. Standards of the lodgings are generally very comfortable. Expect slow, if any, wi-fi access. On Bruny Island, we stay cottage style accommodations: individual rooms some with en-suite bathroom and some with bathrooms shared between 2-3 people

CLOTHING

Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt, over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary, including a jumper / sweater and a wind- and rain-proof jacket.

WHAT TO BRING

Please travel light. Binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors if you're an international guest, insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, sun hat, water bottle, hand sanitizer. Sturdy footwear recommended. Scopes, super-telephoto lenses with tripods, and heavy suitcases are discouraged.
