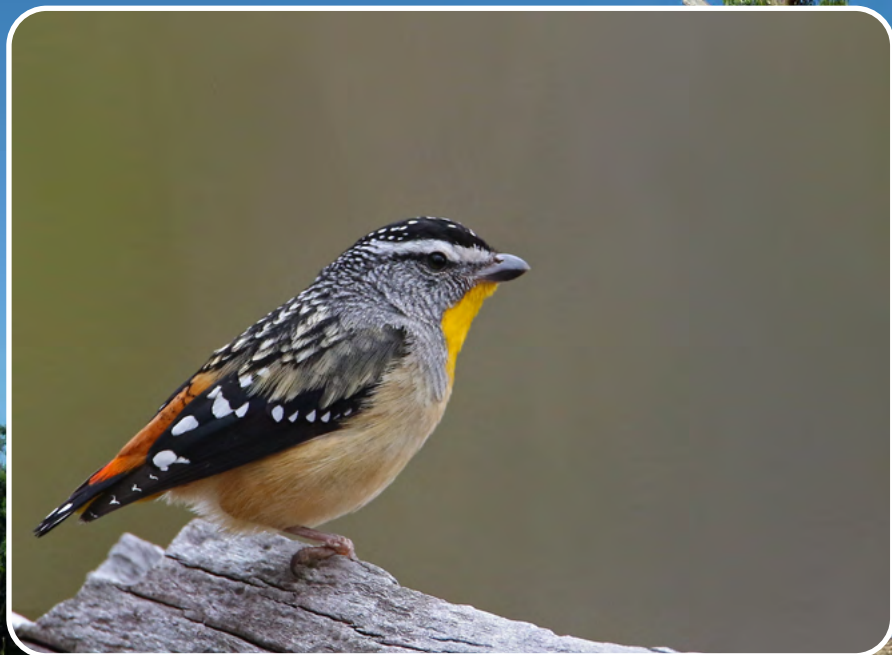


Endemic Families Tour

15 - 28 September 2027

Australia is in the enviable position of having the most endemic bird families of any country in the world with a total of 8. This tour focuses on finding at least 1 species from each of those families. We'll travel from the south-west to the south-east to the stunning rainforest of Lamington National Park, spending time in a diverse range of habitats. Along with our 8 endemic families we'll also be looking for some iconic families and genus that makes Australian birding something not to be missed including Bowerbirds, Birds of Paradise, Logrunner, Australian Treecreepers, Fairywrens, Australian Robins and more. Tantalising add-on options exist.

Australia's endemic bird families and our target species on this tour: Plains Wanderer: The only species in its family; Lyrebirds: We'll look for both Albert's and Superb; Scrubbirds: Noisy; Bristlebirds: Western; Pardalotes: Striated and Spotted; Whipbirds: Eastern and Black-throated; Mud-nesters: White-winged Cough and Apostlebird; Shriketits: Eastern and Western.

We will also look for Australia's largest bird, the Emu, and many near-endemics: megapodes, Magpie Goose, Crested Bellbird, Australian Owl-et-nightjar, Eastern Whipbird, Varied Sitella and more.

Itinerary

Day 0: 17 September 2027

Arrival in Perth

For those who have just completed the pre-tour Red Centre Adventure, we will ensure you arrive in time for our welcome dinner tonight. People not joining this trip will make their own way to our hotel on 17 September in Perth, where we'll all meet this evening for dinner and introductions.

Overnight: Perth, en-suite rooms

Day 1: 18 September 2027

Dryandra Woodlands

We'll do an introductory walk around Kings Park before we visit some magnificent wetlands where we can see Blue-billed and Musk Duck along with many other waterbirds and several raptors. Further afield, the Wugong Gorge is a good spot for Western Australian endemics such as Western Rosella, Red-capped Parrot, and Red-winged Fairy-wren. The Dryandra Woodlands are our destination today and we'll look for Short-billed Black Cockatoo, Blue-breasted Fairy-wren, Western Thornbill, Elegant Parrots and Purple-crowned Lorikeet. This is also a good area to observe native animals such as Numbat, Brush-tailed Bettong and Echidna. Spotlighting for these and for Bush Stone-curlew, Australian Owlet-nightjar and Tawny Frogmouth is an option for those keen to get out in the evening.

Day 2: 19 September 2027

Dryandra to Cheynes Beach

We will spend the morning exploring the Dryandra Woodlands. In addition to the species listed above we also expect to see the western race of Regent Parrot, Western Gerygone, Rufous Treecreeper, Painted Buttonquail, Western Yellow Robin, the western race of Varied Sitella and many other good species. In the afternoon we will drive to beautiful Cheynes Beach where we will have our first attempt at tracking down one or more of the 3 skulkers that live here: Noisy Scrubbird, Western Bristlebird and Black-throated Whipbird.

Day 3: 20 September 2027

Coastal birding

We'll spend the entire day birding the south coast for the first of our endemic families, the notorious and often elusive trio of Noisy Scrub-bird, Western Bristlebird and Black-throated (formerly Western) Whipbird. Noisy Scrubbird, one of Australia's rarest and most elusive species was only rediscovered in 1961. We should hear each of these species multiple times as we attempt to get views of them. This is a very scenic and photogenic landscape with moors, buttongrass plains, eucalypt covered hills and rocky outcrops. Other possible species here are Brush Bronzewing, Southern Emu-wren, Tawny-crowned Honeyeater, Rock Parrot, Stubble Quail, and Red-eared Firetail.

Day 4: 21 September 2027

Beach to Perth

This morning we will spend more time around Cheynes Beach continuing to look for any species that eluded us yesterday. After lunch we will begin the drive back to Perth, checking for Emu all the way, and stopping along the way at several good birding locations including a spot where we hope to find Western Shrike-tit, another of our endemic families.

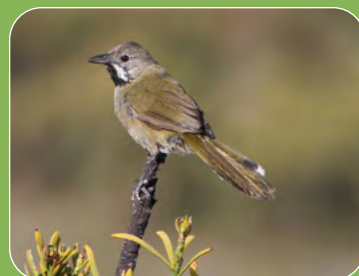
Day 5: 22 September 2027

Flight to Melbourne

We will be up early to catch a flight to Melbourne. Once we land on the other side of Australia, we will have the opportunity to spend the remainder of the afternoon at a great local birding spot that also doubles as an interesting historical record of the first prefabricated timber house bought to colonial Australia from Britain. We'll aim to add Wedge-tailed Eagle, Whistling Kite, Laughing Kookaburra, Sulphur-crested Cockatoo, Eastern Rosella, Superb Fairy-wren, Rufous Whistler and another endemic family in Striated Pardalote.

Day 6: 23 September 2027

Healesville

Today we make our way to scenic Healesville. Along the way we'll be looking for Powerful Owl, Australia's largest owl. Once we arrive in Healesville we'll spend some time searching in the nearby area for species such as the melodious Bell Miner, several Thornbills including Brown, Yellow-rumped and Yellow. We should find Australia's smallest bird, the Weebill as well as the second of our Pardalotes, the Spotted Pardalote.

We'll head to a fantastic short trail north of Healesville in the afternoon where we will spend time in some spectacular temperate rainforest searching for the Superb Lyrebird and Pilotbirds that are often seen following the Lyrebirds waiting for them to dig up a delicious morsel. If luck is on our side, we have the chance to see both Red-browed and White-throated Treecreepers as well as the equally beautiful Rose and Flame Robins.

Day 7: 24 September 2027

Evening birding in Deniliquin

Today we'll do a bit of birding locally in the morning before heading to Deniliquin. We will check into our accommodation and set off again for further birding and after dark, spotlighting for Plains-Wanderer. The species is in a family of its own and is almost extinct. The birds are rarely seen during the day and therefore the evening will be spent searching for them using spotlights. During this evening session we may also see Australian Owlet-nightjar, Inland Dotterel, Australian Bushlark, Little Buttonquail and Stubble Quail. We should be back at our hotel by midnight.

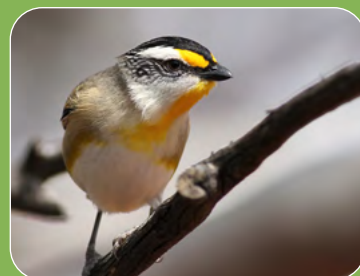

Day 8: 25 September 2027

Woodlands and Waterways of Deniliquin

After our late-night adventures, we'll start not too early in the morning, birding the riverine woodlands and waterways around Deniliquin. Species targeted during the day include Superb Parrot and Black Falcon; a raft of woodland species including chance of Western Gerygone, Eastern Shrike-tit, Diamond Firetail and Dollarbird; waterbirds which are subject to seasonal fluctuations but may include Painted Snipe, Aus-

tralian Bittern and Australian Little Bittern, as well as Spotless Crake, Painted Buttonquail, and depending on seasonal conditions Painted/Pied/Black Honeyeater.

Day 9: 26 September 2027

Back to Melbourne

Heading south this morning back towards the coast where we will spend the day searching for Magpie Goose, Emu and if we have time on our side, we will head down along the coast searching for Rufous Bristlebird, Southern Emuwren, Greater Crested Tern, Pacific Gull, Red Wattlebird as well as White-eared and White-naped Honeyeater.

Day 10: 27 September 2027

Flight to Brisbane

With the option for some birding after breakfast we have the chance to add Cape Barren Goose, Black-fronted Dotterel, Australian Pelican, Straw-necked Ibis, and Yellow-billed Spoonbill.

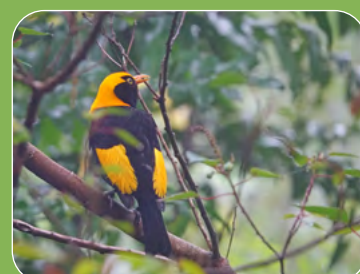
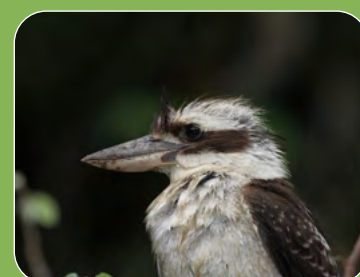
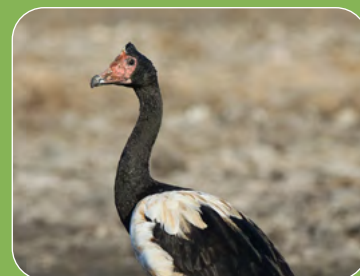
We'll have lunch on the beachfront where we'll have the chance of seeing Chestnut Teal, Black Swan, Pied and Little Pied and Little Black Cormorant as well as Pied Currawong. We'll catch our flight to Brisbane mid-afternoon, touching down in Queensland just in time to get checked into our accommodation before dinner.

Day 11: 28 September 2027

Lamington NP

The focus of this section of the tour is Lamington National Park but en-route we'll look for Noisy Friarbirds, White-cheeked, Brown, Scarlet, Yellow-faced and White-naped Honeyeaters, Rainbow Bee-eater, Azure and Forest Kingfishers, Kookaburras, Pale-headed Rosella, Buff-banded Rail, Red-browed Finch, Maned Duck and Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoos. After settling in at Lamington we'll go birding in the rainforest targeting specialist birds including Regent and Satin Bowerbird, Green Catbird, 3 species of Scrub-wren, White-throated Treecreeper, Black-faced, White-eared and Spectacled Monarchs, Eastern, Pale-yellow and Rose Robin, Eastern Whipbird, Rufous and

Grey Fantail, Spotted Pardalote, Lewin's Honeyeater, Eastern Spinebill, Red-browed Finch, King Parrots, and Crimson Rosella. After dinner there will be the option to go spotlighting for Tawny and Marbled Frogmouths and Boobook Owls.

Day 12: 29 September 2027

Lamington NP

We start early and drive to the western side of the park to look for Albert's Lyrebird, Noisy Pitta, Wonga, Wompoo, White-headed, Brown and Top-knot Pigeons, Paradise Riflebird, Logrunner, Bassian and Russet-tailed Thrush, Golden Whistler, Eastern Shrike-tit, Brown Thornbill, Cicadabird and Brown Gerygone. Mammals that may be seen include Eastern Grey Kangaroo, Whip-tailed, Red-necked and Swamp Wallaby, Red-necked and Red-legged Pademelon, Koala, Platypus, Echidna, Black and Grey-headed Flying Fox, Common Ring-tailed, Short-eared and Common Brush-tailed Possums, Sugar Glider, Long-nosed and Northern Brown Bandicoot.

Day 13: 30 September 2027

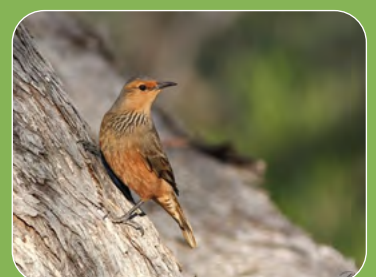
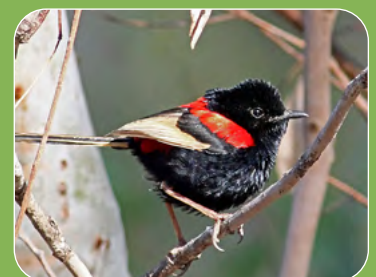
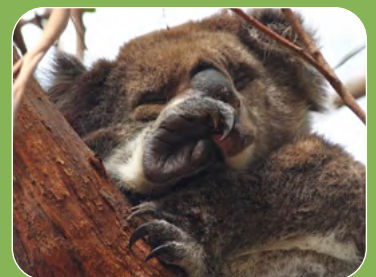
Return to Brisbane and departure

We will spend the morning doing some final birding in Lamington NP before driving back to Brisbane. Some of the species we may encounter include Logrunner, King Parrot, Green Catbird, Red-backed and Variegated Fairywren. We'll finish with a nice lunch in the Botanic Gardens Cafe before dropping you at the airport or your hotel (own arrangements).

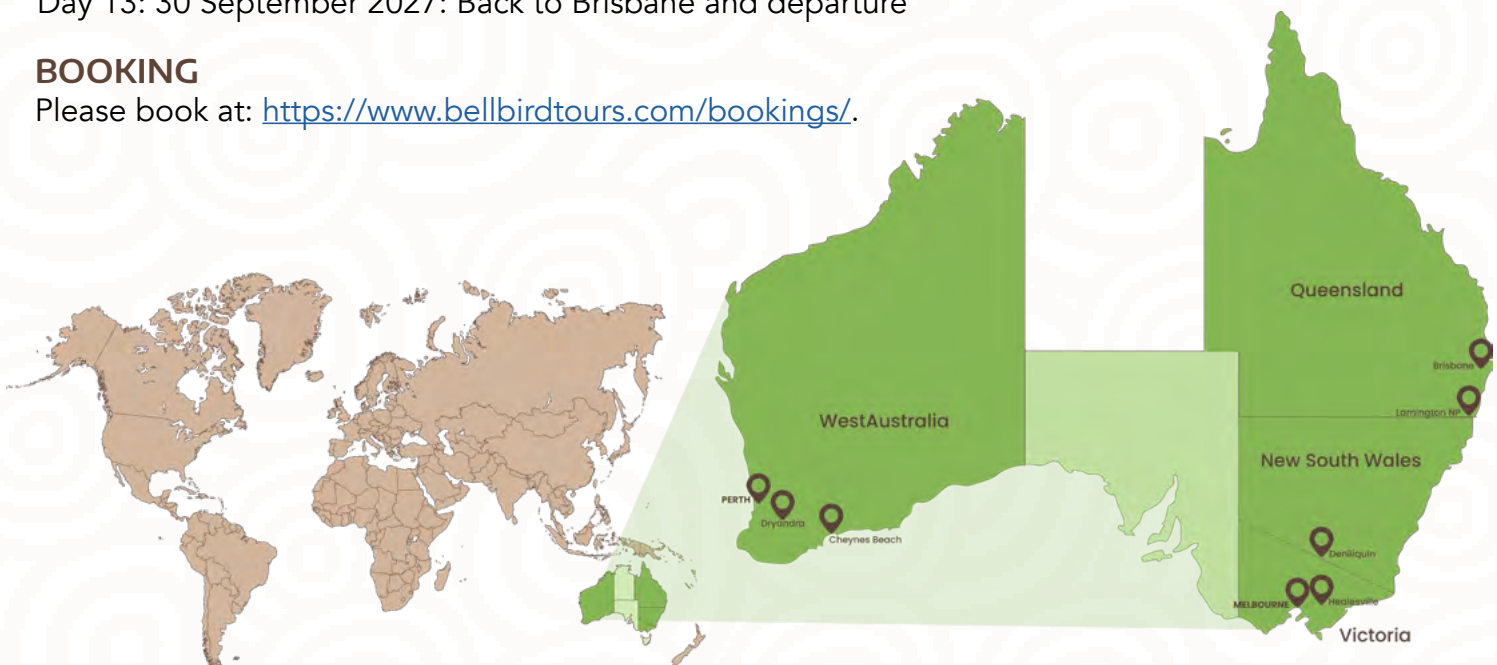

PRACTICAL DETAILS

LEADERS

Expert Bellbird tour leader.

DIFFICULTY

Medium level of fitness required. The tour has a reasonably fast pace and walks are on varying surfaces, from paved roads to uneven, gravelly trails with some short climbs and soft sandy dunes. We generally walk slowly, with lots of stops. You can opt out of any challenging walks.

ACCOMMODATION

Comfortable en-suite air-conditioned motel rooms throughout.

CLOTHING

Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt, over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary, including a rain-proof jacket. Neat casual attire for dinners. Sturdy footwear recommended. Shorts and sandals or thongs (flip-flops) are acceptable for non-birding time.

WHAT TO BRING

Please travel light. Binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors if you're an international visitor, insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, travel umbrella, sun hat, water bottle, hand sanitizer. Sturdy footwear recommended. Scopes, super-telephoto lenses, tripods, and heavy hard-shell suitcases are discouraged.
