

Pilbara Specialties Tour

4-12 August 2027

This exciting tour takes us to the underexplored Western Australian Pilbara region. Here we will look for a number of special bird species. We start in Perth and head up to beautiful Geraldton with its honeyeaters and Western Fieldwren, before relaxing at Shark Bay where Western Grasswren, Chiming Wedgebill and close-up dolphins await us. We cut across the Pilbara to head inland, looking for Sandhill Grasswren, Rufous-crowned Emu-wren, Western Quail-thrush and Western Bowerbird. Heading north we look for the elusive Pilbara Grasswren and Grey Honeyeater. Other birds we're likely to come across during our trav-

els include Painted Finch, Spinifex Pigeon, Rufous Fieldwren, Spinifexbird, Bourke's Parrot, Slaty-backed Thornbill, Black-chinned (Golden-backed) Honeyeater, Little Woodswallow, Southern Scrubrobin and many more. This time of year the weather is generally quite pleasant. We'll visit beautiful Kalbarri NP near Geraldton, the Shark Bay World Heritage site, the vast spinifex plains (of Night Parrot fame...!) of the Pilbara and marvel at the stark outback countryside dotted with granite outcrops between Mt Magnet and Newman. Spaces are limited so don't wait too long to book this great tour!



ITINERARY

Day 1: 4 August 2027 Arrival in Perth and drive to Geraldton

Today you arrive in Perth, and make your own way to our meeting point (Kings Park Botanical Gardens Café) where we'll meet for introductions and lunch at 11:30am. We'll spend the afternoon driving to Geraldton, making a few short birding stops along the way.

Overnight: Sails Motel, en-suite room

Meals included: L, D

Day 2: 5 August 2027 Geraldton to Monkey Mia

We spend the morning in Kalbarri NP where the wildflowers attract good Western Australian species such as Western Spinebill, Western Wattlebird, White-cheeked Honeyeater, and we have a good chance of Blue-breasted Fairywren and Western Yellow Robin. One of the main targets here is the recently split Western Fieldwren. After a picnic lunch we head further north to the Shark Bay area to our final destination, the Monkey Mia resort, right on the beach where Indo-pacific Dolphins regularly come in to feed.

Overnight: Monkey Mia Resort, en-suite hotel rooms

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 3: 6 August 2027 Monkey Mia & Shark Bay

The morning is spent in the Shark Bay area. This stunning World Heritage site is located on the westernmost point of the Australian continent, and its coastal habitats have a number of exceptional natural features, the most well-known of which are its beds of stromatolites: colonies of microbial mats that form hard, dome-shaped deposits which are said to be the oldest life forms on earth. The beautiful remote scenery is home to a population of Western Grasswren which will be the main target of our visit. There are also Purple-backed Fairy-wren, Chiming Wedgebill and Rufous Fieldwren here.

After a lunch in one of the roadside establishments, we will bird our way back to Geraldton. We will visit the stromatolites at Hamelin Pool: there is an excellent birding area around here where we will look for Pied Honeyeater, Crested Bellbird, Red-capped Robin, Hooded Robin, Chestnut-rumped Thornbill, Inland Thornbill, Southern Whiteface, Slaty-backed Thornbill and Mulga Parrot.

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 4: 7 August 2027 Geraldton to Mt Magnet

After a relaxing morning birding, we start heading inland to Mt Magnet. We'll leave the coastal vegetation, travel through eucalypt woodland before end-ing up in a vast sea of "mulga" (narrow-leaved acacia) habitat. This is where we'll find many species that do not occur elsewhere, such as Grey Honeyeater and Western Quail-thrush. Other birds we may come across include Emu (remind the tour leader to tell you about the Emu War!), Crested Bellbird, Budgerigar, Cockatiel, Mulga Parrot, Diamond Dove, Crimson Chat, Black-eared Cuckoo, Pied Butcherbird, Zebra Finch, Pallid Cuckoo and Grey-crowned Babbler. We may be lucky to find White-fronted, Pied & Black Honeyeater depending on seasonal conditions.

Overnight: Outback Gold, en-suite cabin

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 5: 8 August 2027 Of Granite and Sandstone

Today we have a full day in the wider Mt Magnet area. Early in the morning, just after sunrise, we search an area known as the Granites for Western Quail-thrush. Later that morning we head across to an area known as Sandstone, where the Sandhill (not Sandstone) Grasswren lives – a recent split of Rufous Grasswren. This very scenic area is also likely to yield many other good species such as Slaty-backed & Inland Thornbills, Banded Whiteface, Bourke's Parrot, Redthroat, Western Bowerbird, Little Woodswallow and more. After a full day's birding (with picnic lunch taken in the field), we'll return to Mt Magnet for a well-deserved dinner.

Overnight: Outback Gold, en-suite cabin

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 6: 9 August 2027 Nallan Station

This morning is a back-up for any species we still need, or want better views of. Later in the morning we pack up and bird our way to Nallan Station, just an hour's drive up the road. This 99,000 ha working pastoral station is set up for birders. Bird life is abundant on the property.

Exploring the many tracks through the mulga, mallee, and along wa-

terways, we look for Pink Cockatoo, Banded Whiteface, Bourke's Parrot and many other good species. At night, the stars are amazing.

Overnight: Nallan Station Cue, private rooms with shared facilities

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 7: 10 August 2027 Further inland

The morning is spent birding on Nallan Station and then we head north to Newman, birding along the way, with more chances of the previously mentioned species. Lunch is taken in one of the many small roadside venues along the way. After arriving at Newman, we check into our very comfortable lodgings here, have a short break and head out in search of what should be one of the highlights of the trip: Pilbara Grasswren – a recent split of Rufous Grasswren.

Overnight: Seasons Hotel Newman, en-suite hotel room

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 8: 11 August 2027 Pilbara

Today we have a full day in the Pilbara around Newman. Vast spinifex plains are interspersed with mulga woodlands and rocky outcrops, crisscrossed by seasonal, eucalypt-lined waterways. Today's main target is the elusive Grey Honeyeater, for which we have a number of good locations. If needed there is also the opportunity to revisit the Pilbara Grasswren in the spinifex-covered hills just outside the town. Other birds we may see today include Spinifex Pigeon, Rufous-crowned Emuwren, Spinifexbird, Cockatiel, Budgerigar, Western Gerygone, while we also stand a chance of finding the localised welsi race of Black-tailed Treecreeper, Painted Finch, Grey-headed Honeyeater and Slaty-backed Thornbill.

Overnight: Seasons Hotel Newman, en-suite hotel room Meals included: B, L, D

Day 9: 12 August 2027 Departure

This last morning is spent picking up any birds we still need or want better views of. After an early lunch we'll finalise the checklist and drop you off at the airport for your flight home. There are multiple flights per day from Newman to Perth and onwards. Or why not join our Kimberley tour, starting in Broome on 14 Aug? Instant return-client discount applies, details on our website. PRACTICAL DETAILS

LEADERS

Expert Bellbird tour leader.

DIFFICULTY

Medium level of fitness required. The tour has a reasonably fast pace and walks are on varying surfaces, from paved roads to uneven, gravelly trails with some short climbs and soft sandy dunes. We generally walk slowly, with lots of stops. You can opt out of any challenging walks.

ACCOMMODATION

In private en-suite air-conditioned rooms or cabins where possible, as indicated in the daily itinerary.

CLOTHING

In the day it will be cool to mild, but mornings and evenings can be chilly. Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary. Jacket or jumper for the evenings. Neat casual attire for dinners. Sturdy, comfortable footwear for birding. Shorts and sandals or thongs (flip-flops) are acceptable for non-birding time.

WHAT TO BRING

Please travel light; binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors if you're an international guest, insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, sun hat, water bottle, hand sanitizer. Scopes, tripods, huge tele-photo lenses, and hard-cased heavy suitcases are discouraged.
