

Highlights of South Australia

10 - 16 September 2026

This is one of our longest-running tours, but now with an updated itinerary that promises even more birds! We'll explore South Australia's many varied habitats, ranging from the spectacular Flinders Ranges and surrounding stark outback deserts, to the lush Mt Lofty Ranges. We'll discover the wetlands and estuaries around Adelaide, floodplains along the mighty Murray River and the vast expanses of semi-arid eucalypt scrub at Birdlife Australia's Gluepot Reserve. This wide variety of habitats allows us to maximise the species list – expect up to 200 species! These include some highly sought-after birds such as Malleefowl, Banded Stilt, Freckled Duck, Adelaide Rosella,

Regent/Mulga/Elegant Parrot. We'll also be able to spot two species of Grasswren, four of Fairywren, three of Cuckoo, three of Tree-creeper, two of Quail-thrush, as well as Redthroat, Gilberts/Rufous/Golden/Red-lored Whistler, Inland Dotterel and many more.

We'll look for mammals as well, including the endangered Yellow-footed Rock-wallaby and the Southern Hairy-nosed Wombat. Combine all this with great food and amazing accommodations: you won't want to miss out! And as an added bonus, we now also offer a pre-tour extension to Kangaroo Island.

ITINERARY

Day 0: 10 September 2026

Arrival in Adelaide

From 7 - 10 September 2026, we offer an optional pre-tour excursion to Kangaroo Island. Just off the Adelaide coast, this large island harbours a unique and diverse wildlife, specialised birds, striking scenery and vast wilderness. Key birds include the endangered Glossy Black Cockatoo, colonies of Fairy Penguin, Hooded Plover, Cape Barren Goose, the elusive Western Whipbird and the rare Fairy Penguin as well as many sea and land birds. People not joining this trip will make their own way to our hotel on 25 September in Adelaide, where we'll all meet this evening for dinner and introductions.

Overnight: Adelaide, en-suite hotel room

Day 1: 11 September 2026

Adelaide to Lyndhurst

An early start for our trip to the outback. We follow the coast north, looking for Adelaide Rosella and Slender-billed Thornbill. At Port Augusta we visit the beautiful Arid Lands Botanical Gardens where an array of native flowers and shrubs attract such species as Chirruping Wedgebill, Redthroat, White-winged Fairy-wren and many species of Honeyeater including a chance of Pied and Black Honeyeater. A nearby coastal lake often has Banded Stilt.

We will arrive at Mt Lyndhurst, on the edge of the Strzelecki desert, towards the end of the day. While we enjoy a spectacular outback sunset from a vantage point we marvel at the vastness of the landscape and at the same time look around for Inland Dotterel.

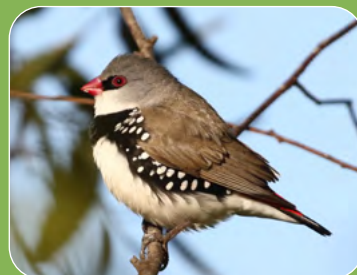
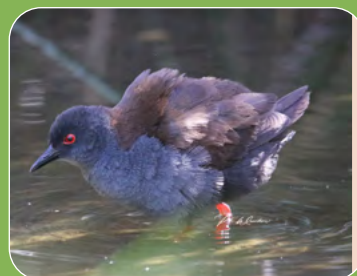
Overnight: Lyndhurst Hotel, en-suite cabins

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 2: 12 September 2026

Lyndhurst and the Strzelecki desert

We depart around sunrise to start birding at nearby Mt Lyndhurst, where, with luck and perseverance, we may see the last few remaining Thick-billed Grasswrens. We should certainly come across other good outback species such as Cinnamon Quail-thrush, Rufous Fieldwren,



White-winged Fairywren, Banded Stilt, Pink Cockatoo, and Striated Grasswren. All photos by Peter Waanders.

Chirruping Wedgebill, Zebra Finch, Black-faced Woodswallow and Budgerigar.

We'll explore the endless open stony plains of the Strzelecki desert, which are traversed by mostly dry watercourses. Expect species such as Budgerigar, Red-backed Kingfisher, Crimson, Orange and Gibber Chat. We'll have a picnic lunch at a billabong (waterhole) with coolabah trees after which we bird our way back to Lyndhurst, looking for Black-breasted Buzzard. If necessary, we return to our sunset viewing point for another chance of Inland Dotterel.

Day 3: 13 September 2026

Gammon Ranges

Today we'll travel south past the spectacular rock formations of the Gammon Ranges and enter the Flinders Ranges, an impressive range of steep hills and soaring rock formations on the edge of Australia's outback. Mid-morning we'll be traveling across dry creekbeds and through narrow gorges cut deeply into geological layers that date back 800 million years. Here we search for Elegant Parrot and Grey-fronted Honeyeater.

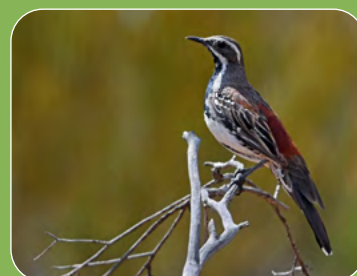
We'll visit the fossil site of the Ediacaran fauna, which lived a little before the great explosion of multicellular life at the beginning of the Cambrian Period. Here we're also likely to encounter the endangered Yellow-footed Rock-wallaby. We'll see stately Wedge-tailed Eagles soaring above spinifex-grass covered slopes and there are plenty of Red, Western Grey and Euro Kangaroos. We'll retire to the Outback Hotel in Hawker for dinner and an optional spotlighting session.

Day 4: 14 September 2026

Flinder Ranges

Early mornings in the outback can get pretty chilly as we check nearby rocky outcrops for Southern Scrubrobin and various honey-eaters. We will leave the picturesque Flinders Ranges and drive south, through the historic copper mining township of Burra, and bird the extensive prairie-like Bluebush plains for Blue Bonnet, Redthroat, Black-eared Cuckoo, Brown & Rufous Songlark and Australian Pipit.

Later in the day we'll reach Australia's largest river: the Murray. We visit a breeding colony of Regent Parrots and check a few wetlands for waterbirds including crakes, rails and Freckled Duck.

Day 5: 15 September 2026 Gluepot wilderness reserve

We depart early in the morning for the drive of less than an hour to Birdlife Australia's Gluepot reserve, home to no less than 6 endangered bird species. While the sun rises over centuries-old mallee eucalypts and sand dunes covered in spinifex grass, we look for Malleefowl, Red-lore Whistler, Gilbert's Whistler, Hooded Robin, Southern Scrubrobin, Black-eared Miner, Shy Heathwren, White-browed Treecreeper and Inland Thornbill. As the bird activity slows down, we focus on species such as Chestnut Quail-thrush, Crested Bellbird, Splendid Fairy-wren and Striped Honeyeater.

Depending on preceding seasonal conditions, we may also encounter White-winged Triller, Pied and Black Honeyeater and Major Mitchell's Cockatoo. From one of the bird hides that overlook a watering trough, we have a chance of observing Mulga Parrot and many of Gluepot's 10 species of Honeyeater. We leave the reserve late in the afternoon to be back at your accommodation around dusk.

Day 6: 16 September 2026 Murray River National Park to Adelaide

Today we'll spend birding our way back to Adelaide. First, we follow the Murray River to check out a number of wetlands for species such as Blue-billed and Freckled Duck, Baillon's, Australian Spotted and Spotless Crake and Little Grassbird. We'll visit a raptor lookout with good chance of Little Eagle, Spotted and Swamp Harrier, Whistling and Black-shouldered Kite and if we're lucky, Black Falcon. We'll have lunch on the banks of the Murray River, where Purple-crowned Lorikeet is often found, after which we proceed into the Adelaide Hills.

While most of South Australia's landscapes are arid, the Adelaide Hills are an exception. Tall, dense eucalypt forests provide a habitat for many species otherwise only found in Australia's eastern states. We will look for Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoo, the *adelaideae* subspecies of Crimson Rosella (often regarded as a full species: Adelaide Rosella),

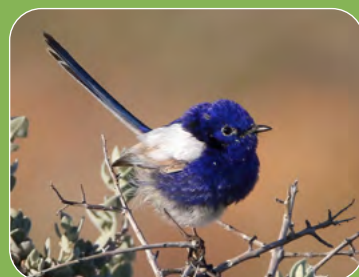
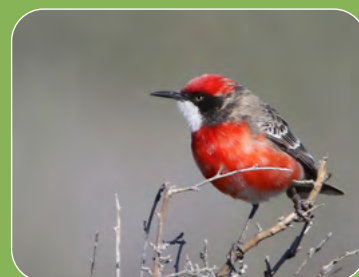
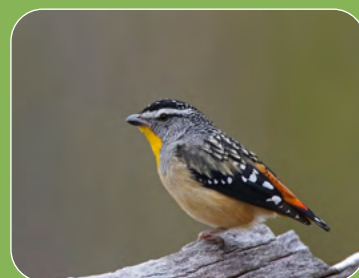


Mulga Parrot, Malleefowl, Red-lore Whistler, Regent Parrot, and Mallee Emu-wren. All photos by Peter Waanders.

Yellow-faced, White-naped and Crescent Honeyeater, White-throated Treecreeper, Scarlet Robin and the localised maculatus subspecies of White-throated Scrubwren. We also have a good chance of seeing a Koala.

The tour finishes in the evening and you will be dropped off between 5 and 6pm at a hotel of your choice in the city centre, or at the airport if you're flying back tonight (please don't book flights departing before 7pm this evening of 16 September 2026).

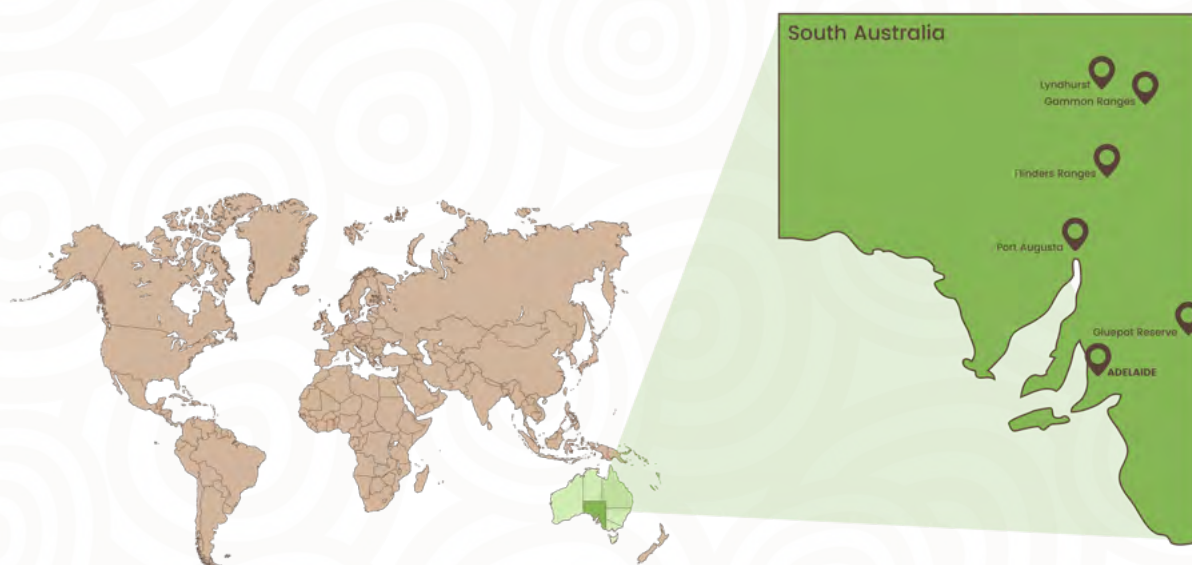

LEADERS

Bellbird guide.

DIFFICULTY

Low level of fitness required. The tour has a relaxed pace and walks are on varying surfaces, from paved roads to sandy or rocky walking trails with some short climbs. We generally walk slowly, with lots of stops. You can opt out of any challenging walks.

ACCOMMODATION

Private en-suite rooms in hotels or lodges. Standards of the lodgings are generally very comfortable. Expect slow, if any, wi-fi access.

CLOTHING

Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt, over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary, including a jumper/sweater and a wind- and rain-proof jacket. Neat casual attire for dinners.

WHAT TO BRING

Please travel light. Binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors if you're an international guest, insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, sun hat, water bottle, hand sanitizer. Sturdy footwear recommended. Scopes, super-telephoto lenses with tripods, and heavy suitcases are discouraged.
