



Kimberley Specials & Black Grasswren Tour

14-24 August 2027

The Western Australian Kimberley region is home to a great variety of special birds. Join us on this exciting tour through this under-explored region. We start the tour in the pearl of the north-west, Broome, where we can't miss a visit to the world-renowned Bird Observatory. Here local endemics and a vast array of waders and shorebirds await us. We make our way through the Kimberley, travelling the famous Gibb River road in comfortable 4WD vehicles. We take a scenic drive to remote Mitchell Plateau where the elusive Black Grasswren awaits us. Expect to see up to 200 species, including Black Grasswren, White-browed Crane,

Spinifex, Partridge & Chestnut-quilled Rock-pigeon, Buff-sided Robin, Red-headed, Yellow-tinted & Kimberley Honeyeater, Dusky & Mangrove Gerygone, Yellow Chat, White-breasted & Mangrove Golden Whistler, Broad-billed Flycatcher, Sandstone Shrike-thrush, Silver-backed Butcherbird, Canary White-eye and many more. We'll finish at the waterways and wetlands near Kununurra. During this tour we'll take our time to explore the many fantastic habitats and landscapes of the remote, unspoilt Kimberley region. Spaces are limited on this exciting tour!

ITINERARY

Day 0: 14 August 2027

Arrival in Broome

Arrival in Broome, the gateway town to the Kimberley, and the first stop on our incredible Western Australia adventure. Getting to Broome is easy – many daily flights arrive from most major centres in Australia. Make your own way to our accommodation where we'll meet for introductions and dinner.

Overnight: Broome Time Resort, en-suite hotel room

Day 1: 15 August 2027

Broome Bird Observatory

Broome, affectionately known as the 'pearl of the north' is the western gateway to the Kimberley wilderness, home to world-famous sunsets and the natural phenomenon of the Staircase to the Moon. But among birders, Roebuck Bay conjures up images of mudflats teeming with waders and shorebirds. While it is a bit early in the season for huge numbers, we stand a good chance of observing a wide variety of shorebirds, including rarer species such as Greater and Lesser Sandplover and Asian Dowitcher.

Today we will visit the famous Broome Bird Observatory from where we'll explore the Roebuck Bay mudflats and neighbouring mangroves in search of waders (with chance of Asian Dowitcher, Broad-billed Sandpiper and who knows: Common Redshank) and other shorebirds, as well as Striated Heron, Eastern Reef Egret, White-breasted and Mangrove Whistler, Broad-billed Flycatcher, Dusky Gerygone, Red-headed Honeyeater, Yellow White-eye and many more excellent birds!

Overnight: Broome Time Resort, en-suite hotel rooms

Day 2: 16 August 2027

Broome to Mt Hart

Today we commence our adventure into the Kimberley in earnest. At our first stop in Derby, we visit the old wharf to look for mangrove species such as Dusky Gerygone and Red-headed Honeyeater. Derby, located on the edge of the King Sound, is believed to have the highest tides of any Australian port with 11 meters (36 feet) of tidal difference!

We'll soon find ourselves onto the famous Gibb River Road leading into to the heart of the Wunaamin Miliwundi (King Leopold) Ranges Conservation Park. The scenery along the road is impressive and there are many small creek crossings on the way in. Sometime during the day, we arrive at Mt Hart Station, which has good accommodation, with tropical gardens and orchards surrounding the homestead, green lawns, and good birding as it is located alongside the Barker River. At Mt Hart Wilderness Lodge we enjoy an authentic Kimberleys homestead experience.

Day 3: 17 August 2027 **Mt Hart Station**

A full day to bird and relax around this fabulous property. The birding around the grounds of the homestead is very pleasant. We may see Australian Bustard and Spotted Nightjar, Great Bowerbird and Green Oriole (subspecies of Yellow Oriole) and with luck, Masked Owl in the evening. We'll take short drives out to various waterholes and other birdy places looking for Banded, Bar-breasted, Yellow-tinted and White-gaped Honeyeater, Green-backed Gerygone, Buff-sided Robin, Little Woodswallow, Leaden Flycatcher and many more, often providing good photographic opportunities.

Day 4: 18 August 2027 **Mt Hart to Drysdale Station**

Today we'll bird our way along the Gibb River Road east and after some time we'll turn off to Drysdale Station. Flocks of Varied Lorikeets and Budgerigar abound. Drysdale Station is our half-way point between Broome and Kununurra. Located on the scenic Drysdale River just off the iconic Gibb River Road, Drysdale Station is a half-million acre, fully operational cattle station that welcomes guests within a genuine outback environment. The very scenic Drysdale River is nearby and excellent for birding. We'll be looking for interesting birds here such as Black-tailed Treecreeper, Northern Rosella, Crimson Finch, Purple-crowned Fairywren and a variety of Honeyeater species.

Day 5: 19 August 2027
Drysdale to Mitchell Falls Plateau

We commence the day birding the Drysdale River for the iconic Purple-crowned Fairywren and chance of Black Bittern, among many other good birds, notably many species of Honeyeater and Finches. After lunch we pack up and head to the Mitchell Falls Plateau, where we'll stay in the stunning Mitchell Falls Lodge.

Overnight: Mitchell Falls Wilderness Lodge, individual glamping-style tent with ensuite

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 6: 20 August 2027
Mitchell Falls Plateau

Today is set to be one of the most exciting days of the entire trip as we search for Black Grasswren around the famous Mitchell Falls Plateau. We'll have an early departure for the short drive to the nearby Mitchell Falls area, where we'll spend the morning exploring the landscape, with its mix of tall grasses interspersed with huge boulders, and spinifex-clad slopes, in search of the elusive Black Grasswren. You'll need to have a good level of fitness for this search. Having found them (fingers crossed!), we'll turn our focus to other birds, such as Kimberley Honeyeater, Chestnut-quilled Rock Pigeon, Partridge Pigeon, Buff-sided Robin and more. In the afternoon, we can relax in the natural pools or at the lodge.

Overnight: Mitchell Falls Wilderness Lodge, individual glamping-style tent with ensuite

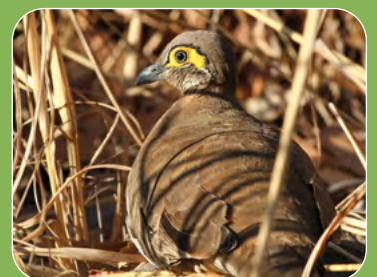

Day 7: 21 August 2027
Mitchell Falls Plateau to Drysdale

A backup morning for Black Grasswren, and then we pack up and depart back to Drysdale. There are plenty of other good birds to spend time with; such as the cute Partridge Pigeons that shuffle around in the dry grass, or Red-backed Fairywrens darting about low bushes. Back at Drysdale, we'll do some birding in the grounds before dinner.

Day 8: 22 August 2027
Drysdale to Kununurra

We start the day birding the Drysdale River for the iconic Purple-crowned Fairywren and chance of Black Bittern, among many other good birds, notably many species of Honeyeater and Finches. Most of the day will be spent driving and birding to reach Kununurra in time for dinner. Around the shores of Lake Kununurra we might be lucky enough to observe the elusive White-browed Crake this evening!

Overnight: Discovery Parks Lake Kununurra, en-suite cabins

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 9: 23 August 2027
Lake Argyle

Today we will be birding the region around Kununurra, including an early morning cruise on Lake Argyle, home to the localized Yellow Chat and a wide variety of other birds. We will look for the white-bellied race of Spinifex Pigeon, Varied Lorikeet, Sandstone Shrike-thrush, Buff-sided Robin, Silver-backed Butcherbird, Star Finch, Masked Finch, Pictorella Mannikin and with perseverance we may even find the rare Gouldian Finch or the localised Yellow-rumped Mannikin.

At the end of the day we return to our rooms for some relaxing by the shores of Lake Kununurra, where we'll end the trip on a high with a fabulous dinner at sunset overlooking the water while tallying up the final bird list of what no doubt will have been a fantastic Kimberley tour!

Day 10: 24 August 2027
Departure from Kununurra

This morning we say goodbye to this stunning region and its cascade of specialist species.

PRACTICAL DETAILS

LEADERS

DIFFICULTY

Medium level of fitness required. The tour has a relaxed pace and walks are on mostly flat, but unpaved, surfaces, but includes some short climbs. **Please note that the Black Grasswren search requires a good physical condition.** Most of the Gibb River road is unsealed; the road surface varies from good to corrugated. We generally walk slowly, with lots of stops. You can opt out of any walks.

ACCOMMODATION

Private en-suite rooms or cabins in hotels or lodges, two nights may be accommodated in glamping-style tents with en-suite facilities. Standards of lodgings are good to very comfortable. Due to the remote nature of this trip, we may not have phone reception or wi-fi access every day.

CLOTHING

In the day it will be warm to hot, evenings can be cool. Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary. Jacket or jumper for the evenings. Neat casual attire for dinners. Sturdy, comfortable footwear for birding. Shorts and sandals or thongs (flip-flops) are acceptable for non-birding time.

WHAT TO BRING

Please travel light; Binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors if you're an international guest, insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, sun hat, water bottle, hand sanitizer. Scopes, tripods, huge tele-photo lenses, and hard-cased heavy suitcases are discouraged.
