



Six Grasswrens Tour

8 - 16 November 2026

One of our most popular outback birding tours, 21 years and counting! This is one of Australia's epic birding adventures: we search for half of all of Australia's current Grasswren species. This is a fast-paced birding trip with lots of walking in many different types of terrain, early departures and late finishes each day, while covering over 2500 km in 8 days. We may encounter harsh outback conditions such as heat, frosty mornings, rain, flooding or dust-storms. Some of the accommodation is a little basic, but charming. Yet the rewards are some of Australia's hardest to find, most sought-after species: Grey, Striated, Short-tailed, Thick-billed, Western and Eyrean Grass-

wren. In addition to the Grasswrens, of course we'll also spend significant time searching for other good outback species such as Budgerigar, Red-lored Whistler, Inland Dotterel, Honeyeaters including Pied and Grey-fronted; Banded White-face, Gibberbird, chats, Chestnut and Cinnamon Quail-thrush and many more. Some years we see Letterwinged Kites and Flock Bronzewing – their presence depends on preceding rainfall. You'll return home from this trip with an impressive list of outback birds!

ITINERARY

Day 0: 8 November 2026

Arrival in Adelaide

You will be transferred from a meeting point (to be announced) in Adelaide departing 3:00pm and head to Berri to meet your guide(s) for dinner and introductions.

Overnight: Berri Resort Hotel, en-suite rooms

Day 1: 9 November 2026

Exploring the 'mallee' wilderness

We depart before sunrise to explore a 1,000,000 ha large wilderness of 'mallee' eucalypt scrubland. This area contains a number of reserves, including Birdlife Australia's Gluepot Reserve, Murray Sunset NP and others. Where exactly we'll go in this wilderness depends on preceding seasonal conditions. It is sure to be an impressive exploration as we find ourselves off the beaten track in search of our first Grasswren species: Striated Grasswren.

Here we also target Red-lored Whistler, of which we have had excellent views on previous trips, and localised Mallee Emuwren. Other species we look for include Southern Scrubrobin, Shy Heathwren, Chestnut Quail-thrush, Little Friarbird, Striped, Yellow-plumed and White-eared Honeyeater, White-browed Treecreeper and with luck Malleefowl.

Overnight: Berri Resort Hotel, en-suite rooms

Day 2: 10 November 2026

Murray and Darling rivers to Broken Hill

We depart early for further birding in the mallee reserves surrounding Berri, with targets being Chestnut Quail-thrush, Gilbert's Whistler, Red-throat, Regent Parrot and Mulga Parrot.

Heading east, we should see Pink Cockatoos and Blue Bonnets. After lunch at the scenic confluence of Australia's two major rivers: the Murray and the Darling, with many waterbirds, we turn north to Broken Hill, where we may encounter our first Chirruping Wedgebills.

Overnight: Outback Lodge Broken Hill, en-suite rooms

Day 3: 11 November 2026
North to Tibooburra

We follow the road north, with further chances of Chirruping Wedgebill, Bluebonnet and Pink Cockatoo. We stop at the eccentric Packsaddle Plains roadhouse where we may come across Ground Cuckoo-shrike and with even more luck, Bourke's Parrot. We have lunch in Tibooburra and soon after we'll explore the vast expanses of Sturt NP. Once or twice on these trips we've come across Grey Falcon here! In the same area we also have a small chance of Black Falcon and Australian Bustard. More regularly encountered birds here include Gibberbird, Inland Dotterel, Cinnamon Quail-thrush and Australian Pratincole. But in this boom-and-bust environment, birds are highly nomadic, so what we see varies from year to year. Returning around nightfall across the gibber plains surrounding Tibooburra we may see Bourke's Parrot and Inland Dotterel.

Overnight: Tibooburra Granites Motel, en-suite room

Day 4: 12 November 2026
Outback swamps to Cameron Corner

An early start for one of the drawcards of this trip! We're off to search the vast outback swamps on the NSW-Queensland border for the enigmatic Grey Grasswren. Later today we continue birding through Sturt National Park, with chances of Flock Bronzewing in wet years, Inland Dotterel and Red-browed Pardalote. At Cameron Corner, the point where South Australia, Queensland and New South Wales meet, we spend the afternoon searching for Cinnamon Quail-thrush and Banded Whiteface. On a previous occasion we've even seen Grey Falcon!

Overnight: Cameron Corner Store Cabins, basic private rooms with shared bathrooms
Meals included: B, L, D

Day 5: 13 November 2026
Strzelecki Desert

We depart around sunrise for a visit to the red sand dunes to search for Eyrean Grasswren, Cinnamon Quail-thrush and any other species still needed. We will now enter one of the remotest parts of outback Australia as we continue our journey west, where depending on seasonal conditions, we may come across Black-breasted Buzzard and Letter-winged Kite (not present each year). We then join the Strzelecki track and turn south.

In the white sand dunes of the Strzelecki desert we have another chance of Eyrean Grasswren. We have lunch at a water-hole fed by an artesian bore, with flocks of Zebra Finches, chats and White-backed Swallows. The endless open stony plains of the Strzelecki desert are traversed by mostly dry watercourses. We will follow the track south across the desert, looking for species such as Budgerigar, Red-backed Kingfisher, Crimson, Orange and Gibber Chat. At sunset we arrive at the Lyndhurst Hotel, a typical outback pub with basic facilities but lots of character.

Overnight: Lyndhurst Hotel, en-suite cabins
Meals included: B, L, D

Day 6: 14 November 2026 **Mt Lyndhurst and Flinders Ranges**

We spend the morning birding at Mt Lyndhurst, on the edge of the Strzelecki desert, to search for Thick-billed Grasswren, Inland Dotterel, Cinnamon Quail-thrush, Chirruping Wedgebill, Rufous Fieldwren, Budgerigar and Cockatiel.

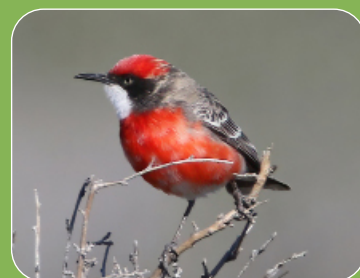
In the afternoon we drive along the Flinders Ranges, an impressive range of hills and rock formations on the edge of the outback. We search for the endangered Yellow-footed Rock-wallaby and are also likely to come across Grey-fronted Honeyeater, Elegant Parrot and Redthroat. Towards the end of the day we visit the Arid Lands Botanical Gardens in Port Augusta, where there are often Pied and Black Honeyeaters present this time of year. Tonight's dinner in one of the best Indian restaurants is sure to be a highlight, and they also have a good selection of standard western dishes.

Overnight: Standpipe Motel Port Augusta, en-suite rooms
Meals included: B, L, D

Day 7: 15 November 2026 **Gawler Ranges**

This morning we depart early to a site for Western Grasswren before venturing into the Gawler Ranges, where we comb the spinifex-grass covered slopes for the elusive Short-tailed Grasswren. On some of our previous trips we have had views of this species almost too close for binocular focus! Other birds we are likely to come across include Slender-billed Thornbill, Rufous Fieldwren, Redthroat and the beautiful 'turquoise' range of Splendid Fairywren.

Overnight: Mt Ive Station, some en-suite cabins, some non-en-suite historical cottage rooms
Meals included: B, L, D

Day 8: 16 November 2026**Gawler Ranges**

This morning we'll have another chance at Short-tailed Grasswren, after which we search the Bluebush plains nearby for Western Grasswren. Watching the sun rise across the beautiful, spinifex-covered hills of the Gawler Ranges is one of life's little pleasures. Other birds we are likely to come across here are Hooded Robin, Southern Whiteface, Black-eared Cuckoo and Slender-billed thornbill. We'll then follow the coast south, looking for Banded Stilt, Elegant Parrot, the rosinae race of Slender-billed Thornbill and the rosina race of White-browed Scrubwren, to arrive in Adelaide in the evening. Over our last meal together we'll prepare the final bird list and reminisce about the many great birds we've seen and experiences we've had...!

Overnight: Hotel in Adelaide, en-suite hotel rooms.

DIFFICULTY

Medium to high level of fitness required. This fast-paced trip is not for the faint-hearted, with lots of walking in sometimes difficult terrain, early departures and late finishes each day, while driving around 2,500 km (almost half on unsealed roads of varying condition). While unlikely, we may encounter harsh outback conditions such as heat, frosty mornings, rain storms, flooding or dust. You can opt out of any challenging activities if you like.

ACCOMMODATION

Private en-suite rooms in hotels or lodges. Some nights will be in more basic, non-en-suite cabins or historical cottage rooms. Standards of the lodgings are generally very comfortable. Expect slow, if any, wi-fi access.

CLOTHING

Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt, over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary, including a jumper / sweater and a wind- and rain-proof jacket.

WHAT TO BRING

Please travel light. Binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors if you're an international guest, insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, sun hat, water bottle, hand sanitizer. Sturdy footwear recommended. Scopes, super-telephoto lenses with tripods, and heavy suitcases are discouraged.
