

Savannah to Tropics

21 - 29 August 2027

This tour is designed to link to our preceding *Nine Grasswren #4* tour and our following *Top End #4* tour. Of course it can be taken as a stand-alone birding tour as well. We will be exploring the Gulf and Savannah country, the stark landscape around Mount Isa and the lush tropical highlands surrounding Cairns. The trip is run during the dry season, generally a great time to go birding in this region as the weather will be balmy and birds abound. During these 8 days we expect to see up to 200 species, including sought-after birds such as Purple-crowned Fairy-wren, Buff-sided Robin, up to 10 species of finch including Black-throated Finch; Great-billed Heron, White-breasted Whistler, Red-headed Honeyeater, Mangrove Fantail,

Mangrove Robin, Yellow White-eye, Mangrove Gerygone, Sandstone Shrike-thrush, Golden Bowerbird, Spinifex Pigeon and even the enigmatic Grey Falcon. Visiting Lawn Hill NP, Burketown, the Karumba mangroves, Cumberland Dam and the Atherton Tablelands, we'll explore a variety of habitats: deep red sandstone gorges and pandanus-lined creeks, mangroves, coastal mudflats, endless grassy plains, open woodlands and lush tropical forests. There's even the option to take a cruise to the famous seabird colonies on the Great Barrier Reef. This tour has it all – enquire now!

ITINERARY

Day 0: 21 August 2027

Arrival in Mount Isa

Make your own way to Mount Isa and take a taxi from the airport (own arrangements) to our hotel (included) for dinner and introductions. Day 1: 22 August 2027

Lake Moondarra and Boodjamulla

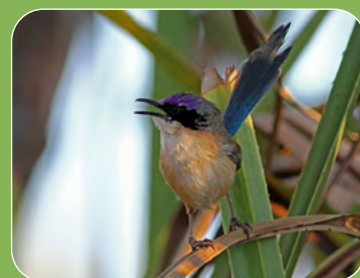
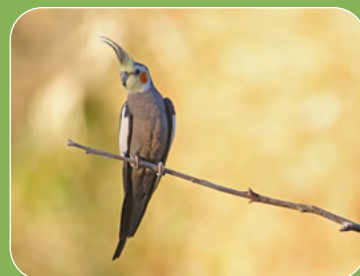
After breakfast we visit Lake Moondarra, an impressive reservoir on the Leichhardt River, with a wide selection of water and shorebirds, and a great collection of land species surrounding the lake. Wandering and Plumed Whistling-Duck, Green Pygmy-Goose, Comb-crested Jacana, Glossy Ibis are usually seen, whereas the surrounding areas hold Long-tailed, Zebra, Painted and Double-barred Finch, Diamond and Bar-shouldered Dove. Freshwater Crocodile and Purple-necked Rock-wallaby are possible here too. Later in the morning we set off to Lawn Hill. The spectacular Boodjamulla (Lawn Hill) National Park adjoins the Queensland-Northern Territory border; we'll make our base at Adels Grove caravan park situated on Lawn Hill Creek adjacent to the park. Spotighting tonight could produce Boobook and Barking Owls and perhaps Spotted Nightjar.

Overnight: Adels Grove, Lawn Hill, en-suite cabins in scenic caravan park with birds in the creekside gardens

Day 2: 23 August 2027

Lawn Hill National Park

We have all day to explore Lawn Hill NP. Starting at the Lawn Hill creek, Buff-sided Robin is usually awaiting us here! Also around here are Northern Rosella, Varied and Red-collared Lorikeet, Red-winged Parrot, Great Bowerbird and Silver-crowned Friarbird. But the real highlight will be birding along the deep blood-red gorge near the beautiful Indarri Falls. Along the creek we look for one of the main targets: the delicately colored Purple-crowned Fairy-wren. Other birds along here include White-bellied Sea-Eagle, Azure Kingfisher, Blue-winged Kook-

aburra, Olive-backed Oriole, Paperbark Flycatcher, Northern Fantail and Crimson Finch. Little Friarbird, White-bellied Cuckoo-shrike, Variegated and Red-backed Fairy-wren are also possible today, while in the rocky escarpments at Lawn Hill we look for Sandstone Shrike-thrush and Little Wood-swallow. Flowering plants attract honeyeaters such as White-gaped, Yellow-tinted, Grey-headed, Grey-fronted, Brown, Black-chinned, White-throated, and Rufous-throated. And there's always the chance of the elusive Grey Falcon!

Overnight: Adels Grove, Lawn Hill, en-suite cabins in scenic caravan park with birds in the creekside gardens

Day 3: 24 August 2027 Lawn Hill to Burketown

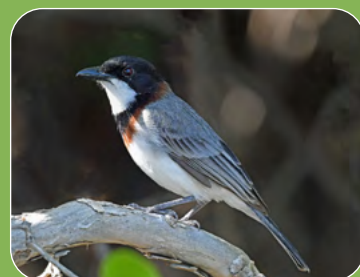
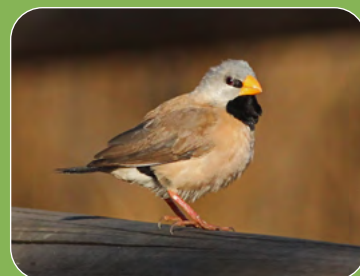
In the morning we'll exploring Lawn Hill some more, before packing up and departing late morning to head to Burketown. In the tropical woodland we have chances of Varied Lorikeet, Spinifex Pigeon and Long-tailed and Painted Finch while on the Mitchell grass floodplains we have, in some years, seen Flock Bronzewing and, more often, Australian Bustard. Arriving in Burketown, time permitting we start birding the Gregory River.

Overnight: Savanah Lodge, Burketown, private en-suite cabins set amongst lush tropical bird-rich gardens
Meals included: B, L, D

Day 4: 25 August 2027 Gregory River to Karumba

An exciting morning as we bird the Gregory River. Lined with pandanus, this picturesque river is one of Australia's few reliable spots for Mangrove Golden Whistler and also a good back-up spot for Purple-crowned Fairy-wren. Other species we should come across include Mangrove Robin, Crimson and Masked finches, Golden-backed and Bar-breasted honeyeater. Late morning we depart and travel east to Karumba. Birds we may encounter along the way include the nomadic, unpredictable Pictorella Mannikin. Some years there are large flocks of this cute bird while other years they are nowhere to be found. We'll keep our eyes on the sky for raptors such as Black-breasted Buzzard and Square-tailed Kite.

Day 5: 26 August 2027

Karumba

All day Karumba area. Our accommodation is within a stone's throw of the beach and mangroves. A great list of species is possible today. This morning we'll bird the Karumba mangroves by boat, looking for mangrove specialities such as Great-billed Heron, White-breasted Whistler, Mangrove Gerygone, Red-headed Honeyeater, Mangrove Fantail, Mangrove Robin and Yellow White-eye. While checking the mudflats for waders we'll no doubt see Eastern Osprey and Brahminy Kite. The afternoon is spent birding the Karumba area to pick up species such as Brolga, Sarus Crane, Black-necked Stork and Australian Pratincole, together with many bush birds and a choice of raptors. Red-tailed Black Cockatoos come in to drink on the golf course. Sunset from the pub at Karumba is spectacular, and so is the birding. Because the mudflats are directly in front of the pub, it's possible to do some serious wader-watching while having a quiet beer.

Overnight: Holiday Units, Karumba Point, private en-suite rooms

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 6: 27 August 2027

Karumba to Georgetown

We'll pick up any species still needed in the Karumba area before heading east, seeing more Sarus Cranes and Brolgas along the way, as well as Australian Bustard and birds of prey such as Black-breasted Buzzard, Spotted Harrier, Wedge-tailed Eagle and Brown, Black and Peregrine Falcon. Closer to Georgetown we bird the dry tropical woodlands and a couple of dams surrounding the town which are usually a good area for finches: Pictorella and Chestnut-breasted Mannikin, Zebra, Masked and Double-barred Finch and the rare Black-throated Finch is hot on the target list here. Other birds include Yellow, Banded and Rufous-throated Honeyeater, Diamond dove, Red-browed Pardalote and Brown Treecreeper ('Black Treecreeper' melanota ssp), Black-breasted Buzzard, Australian Bustard, Squatter Pigeon, Dollarbird, Red-winged Parrot, Pale-headed Rosella.

Overnight: Motel in Georgetown, private en-suite rooms

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 7: 28 August 2027

Georgetown to Cairns

First thing in the morning we'll find ourselves at Cumberland Dam, located near a former gold town. One of Australia's top birding sites, an amazing 171 species of bird have been recorded here in a rela-

tively small area. Honeyeaters include Yellow-tinted, Rufous-throated, Brown, Yellow, Banded, and Blue-faced Honeyeater. Up to six species of finches can be found here: Zebra, Double-barred, Black-throated, Masked and Plum-headed Finch and Chestnut-breasted Mannikin. Of waterbirds, there are plenty: Green Pygmy-Goose, Magpie Goose, Hard-head, Grey Teal, Pink-eared, Pacific Black and Australian Wood Duck, Intermediate and Great Egret, White-faced and White-necked Heron, Australasian Grebe, Little Black and Little Pied Cormorant, Australasian Darter, Australian Pelican, Black-winged Stilt, Red-kneed and Black-fronted Dotterel and Comb-crested Jacana. Rarer waterbirds recorded here include Cotton Pygmy-Goose, Freckled Duck, Black Bittern and Australian Painted Snipe, so we'll keep our eyes open for those too. Then there is a great variety of woodland species: Squatter Pigeon, Diamond and Peaceful Dove, Brown ('Black') Treecreeper, Red-backed Fairy-wren, White-throated Gerygone, Black-faced Woodswallow, Paperbark Flycatcher, Apostlebird, White-bellied Cuckoo-shrike and Australasian Bushlark while woodland parrots include Pale-headed Rosella, Red-winged Parrot, Cockatiel, Budgerigar, Red-tailed Black-Cockatoo, Varied Lori-keet and raptors such as Whistling and Black Kite, Nankeen Kestrel, Collared Sparrowhawk, Australian Hobby, Brown and Black Falcon....

We leave the Mitchell Grass plains behind and head into the tropical woodlands of the western slopes of the Great Dividing Range. On the last stretch of our trip into Cairns we'll be traversing the Atherton Tablelands where we'll give you a little 'teaser' of our next tour: we'll look for gems such as Cassowary, Golden Bowerbird, Spotted Catbird, Pale Yellow Robin, Atherton Scrub-wren, Mountain Thornbill, Victoria's Riflebird, Bower's Shrike-thrush, Grey-headed Robin and Macleay's and Bridled honeyeaters. But to really do this area justice you'll need to join our *Tropical & Far North Queensland* tour starting tomorrow.

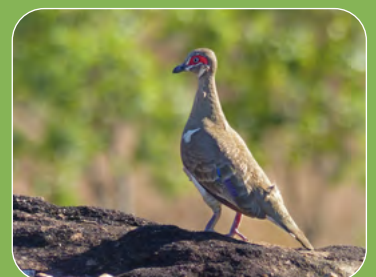
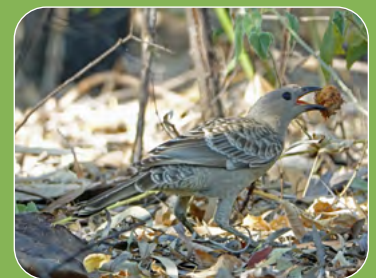
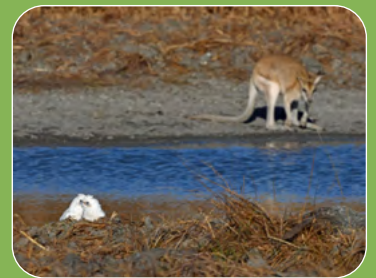
Day 8: 29 August 2027

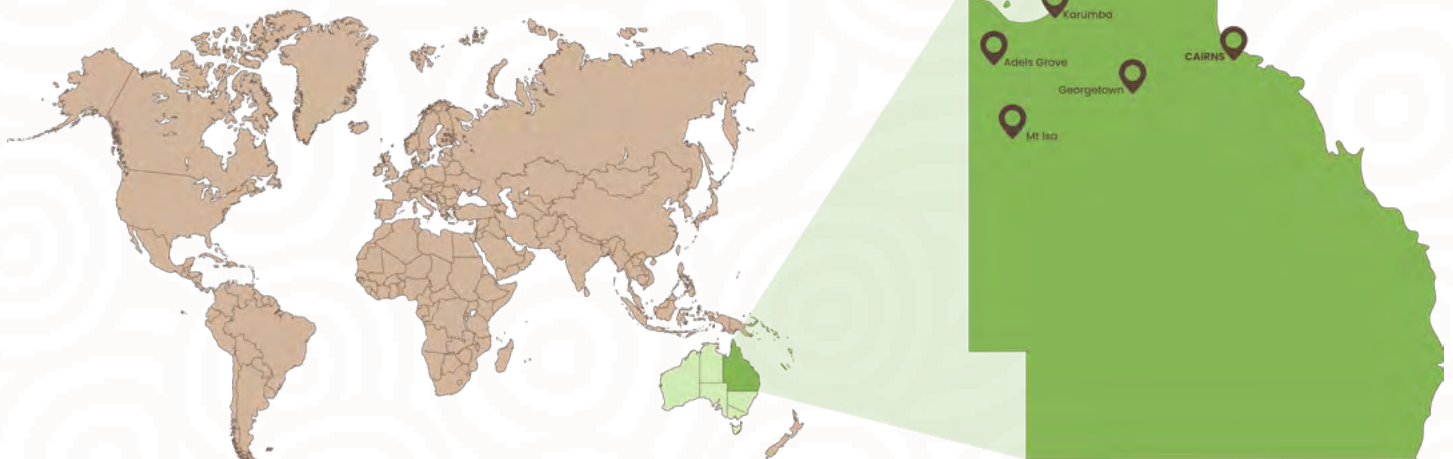

This is a slower-paced version of our Nine Grasswren tour, adding 4 days to the standard itinerary, and using the best available accommodation, while taking the same route. We regularly run multiple departures per year of this popular tour. This is one of Australia's epic birding adventures, where we search for nine of Australia's 13 Grasswren species: Striated, Short-tailed, Western, Thick-billed, Eyrean, Grey, Kalkadoon, Carpentarian and Opalton Grasswren. We explore the vast expanses of Mallee scrub in the Vic-SA border region, the scenic Flinders Ranges, travel the entire Birdsville track through the outback, visit the stark country around Boulia-Winton and the rocky ranges around Mt Isa. This trip is a real adventure (yet fully accommodated), taking us through the heart of the outback during the Australian winter season, generally a great time to go birding.

During these 16 days we expect to see some 200 species, and besides the Grasswrens we have a good chance of sought-after birds like Red-lored Whistler, Mallee & Rufous-crowned Emu-wren, Banded Whiteface, Chestnut, Cinnamon & Chestnut-breasted Quail-thrush, Gibberbird, Yellow Chat, Inland Dotterel, Flock Bronzewing, Spinifex Pigeon, Painted Finch, Hall's Babbler, and even the enigmatic Grey Falcon. You can also link this *Savannah to Tropics* tour to our following **Top End Tour #4** from 30 August to 7 September 2027. One of Australia's top birding destinations, the Northern Territory's 'Top End' includes tantalizing destinations such as Kakadu National Park, Nitmiluk National Park, Pine Creek, Katherine and Judbarra/Gregory National Park (Timber Creek Region). A raft of wonderful birds inhabit this scenic area, including the sought-after Gouldian Finch, the rare Hooded Parrot, the localized Chestnut-quilled Rock Pigeon, the elusive Red Goshawk; the stunning Rainbow Pitta and many other specialties. In addition, we'll look for Saltwater Crocodile, the endemic Short-eared Rock-wallaby and other macropods.

During the tour we can expect up to ten finch species including Gouldian, Masked and Star Finches and Yellow-rumped and Pictorella Mannikins; parrots such as the endemic Hooded Parrot, Northern Rosella, Red-winged Parrot, Cockatiel, Budgerigar, Red-tailed Black Cockatoo; pigeons including Chestnut-quilled and White-quilled Rock-pigeon, Partridge Pigeon; quails and button-quails; a variety of Honeyeaters; and a raft of waterfowl and good chance of Black Bittern and Great-billed Heron. DIFFICULTY

Low to medium level of fitness required. The tour has a relaxed to moderate pace, and walks are on varying surfaces, from paved roads to sandy or rocky walking trails with some short climbs. We generally walk slowly, with lots of stops. You can opt out of any challenging walks. The tour contains some long drives on (at times corrugated) gravel roads. You can opt out of any challenging activities if you like.

ACCOMMODATION

Private en-suite rooms in hotels or lodges. Standards of the lodgings are generally very comfortable. Expect slow, if any, wi-fi access.

CLOTHING

Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt, over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary, including a jumper / sweater and a wind- and rain-proof jacket. Neat casual attire for dinners. Be prepared for balmy weather and gloriously sunny days.

WHAT TO BRING

Please travel light. Binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors if you're an international guest, insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, sun hat, water bottle, hand sanitizer. Sturdy footwear recommended. Scopes, super-telephoto lenses with tripods, and heavy suitcases are discouraged.
