



Kangaroo Island

27 October - 1 November 2028

Just off the Adelaide, SA, coast, Kangaroo Island harbours a unique, diverse wildlife, specialised birds, striking scenery (including remarkable granite formations) and vast tracts of wilderness, protected in many reserves. The dawn chorus at sunrise is something to behold, and walking through the bush is rewarded with a delight of sounds and images from a huge variety of different bird species. Spectacular coastlines harbour an amazing variety of birds and wildlife.

Well-known for its wildlife, Kangaroo Island is home to "Kangaroo Island Kangaroos", Tammar Wallabies, Echidnas, Brush-tailed Possums, Bottle-nosed Dolphins, Australian Sea Lions, Austra-

lian and New-Zealand Fur Seals and many of the 250 birds listed for the island can be seen year-round in their natural habitats during our 4-day guided tour. Key birds include the endangered Glossy Black Cockatoo, colonies of Short-tailed Shearwaters, Hooded Plover, Cape Barren Goose, Rock Parrot, the elusive Western (White-bellied) Whipbird and the cute Little Penguin as well as many sea and land birds.

This all-inclusive guided tour departs from and returns to Adelaide, SA. You will stay on the island and take daily trips out exploring its natural wonders, fascinating habitats, prolific birds and varied wildlife.

Itinerary

Day 0: 27 October 2028 Arrival in Adelaide

Please arrive in Adelaide on 27 October 2028, in preparation for an early departure tomorrow morning. **Transport, meals and accommodation are your own responsibility today.** We will pick you up from your accommodation in the city centre tomorrow morning. If you're staying elsewhere, please contact us to arrange a central meeting location.

Day 1: 28 October 2028 Fleurieu Peninsula and ferry to Kangaroo Island

The tour commences today after breakfast. You'll be picked up from your hotel and we will travel down the scenic Fleurieu Peninsula, stopping along the way to look at some of the mainland birds such as Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoo, Adelaide Rosella and various waterbirds. At the end of the peninsula we will reach Cape Jervis, the departure point for the Kangaroo Island ferry. The ferry takes about 45 minutes to cross, and we may see ocean birds such as Australasian Gannet and up to three species of Shearwater during the crossing.

After arrival on the island, we will have lunch as we travel to our accommodation scenically located at the bay of American River where we will be staying for two nights in quality en-suite rooms at the Mercure Kangaroo Island lodge, surrounded by lush bushland.

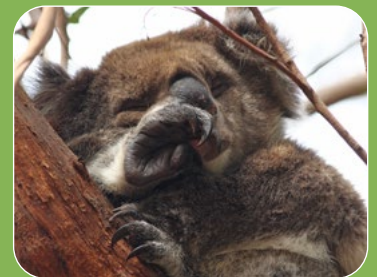
Once settled in we can head out birding for the rest of the day. The bay across from the lodge often has Black-tailed Nativehens, Latham's Snipe and a host of other bush birds.

In the evening spotlighting in and around the park can be very rewarding with an amazing range of nocturnal animals such as Tammar Wallabies, Koalas and Brown Bandicoots which can all be commonly encountered here.

Overnight: Mercure American River, en-suite rooms

Day 2: 29 October 2028 Cape du Couedic, Seal Bay, American River, and Penneshaw

Today we'll explore the various National Parks which cover many parts of the island. Kangaroo Island offers easy viewing of the rare Cape Barren Goose, and it is also famous for its abundant Koalas and Kanga-

roo Island Grey Kangaroos (the kangaroo from which the island gets its name). We may also see the Short-beaked Echidna as it forages for ants and termites.

First thing in the morning we'll head down to the south coast in the hope of spying the hard-to-see Western (White-bellied) Whipbird and Southern Emu-wren. The coastal scenery here is spectacular and is home to a colony of New Zealand Fur Seals at Cape du Couedic where we'll also find the magnificent Admiral's Arch, a spectacular coastal grotto. We'll allow plenty of time to photograph the various rock formations at Remarkable Rocks and Admiral's Arch while we search the surrounding bush for Crescent, Tawny-crowned and Purple-gaped Honeyeaters. We'll head back to the visitor centre for lunch and then visit the seal colony at Seal Bay.

Next, we're off to the north coast where we hope to see breeding Hooded Plovers on the beach and have our first chance to see the endangered Glossy Black Cockatoo. Biologists and local landholders have taken steps to expand the breeding opportunities of this species, and its population is slowly growing. Back to American River for another chance of seeing the Glossy Black Cockatoo along with waders, waterbirds, the elusive Nankeen Night Heron and bush birds such as the Beautiful Firetail. We'll have dinner in Penneshaw before visiting the Penguin Centre after sunset for the chance of seeing breeding Little Penguins on a guided tour of their colony.

Overnight: Mercure American River, en-suite rooms

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 3: 30 October 2028

Flexible morning birding, ferry to the mainland, and Murray Estuary

If required, we'll have another search for the Glossy Black Cockatoo or any other birds we may still need before checking out of our accommodation and heading back toward Kingscote. We'll look for breeding Ospreys before heading to Penneshaw to take the ferry back to the mainland. We'll keep an eye out for Short-tailed Shearwaters and Australasian Gannets that may be foraging above the ocean.

Not far from here is the estuary of Australia's largest river, the Murray, and we'll skirt around this huge lagoon checking out various sites en-route. One of these sites is Tolderol Reserve, which is one of South Australia's best kept birding secrets. A series of small lagoons with varying water levels harbour an amazing variety of water-dependent bird species, including Caspian and Whiskered Tern, numerous migratory waders—Sharp-tailed Sandpiper is common, there are usually a few

Pectoral Sandpipers around, and more often than not, some rarity turns up here. Ducks, swans, grebes, herons, egrets and the rare, elusive Australasian Bittern also live here. One of the cutest 'little brown jobs' is the Golden-headed Cisticola and with luck we'll see a few of these little gems. At the end of the day we arrive in Meningie, on the far eastern end of the estuary, at the start of the longest salt lagoon in the world: the Coorong National Park.

Overnight: Lakeview Motel, Meningie, en-suite rooms

Day 4: 31 October 2028 **Coorong National Park, and return to Adelaide**

This morning we'll head into the Coorong National Park to see the stunning coastal scenery—salt pans, tranquil lagoons, huge sand dunes—and look for birds such as Purple-gaped Honeyeater, Southern Scrub Robin, the elusive and local specialty Rufous Bristlebird and who knows, with much luck a Malleefowl.

Stopping on the way back to Adelaide in the scenic, lush Adelaide Hills we look for a variety of colourful parrots including the Adelaide Rosella, Scarlet Robin, Brown and White-throated Treecreeper, Australian Owl-et-nightjar on its daytime roost, White-winged Chough, many species of honeyeaters and with luck, the beautiful Diamond Firetail. We arrive back in Adelaide sometime in the afternoon.

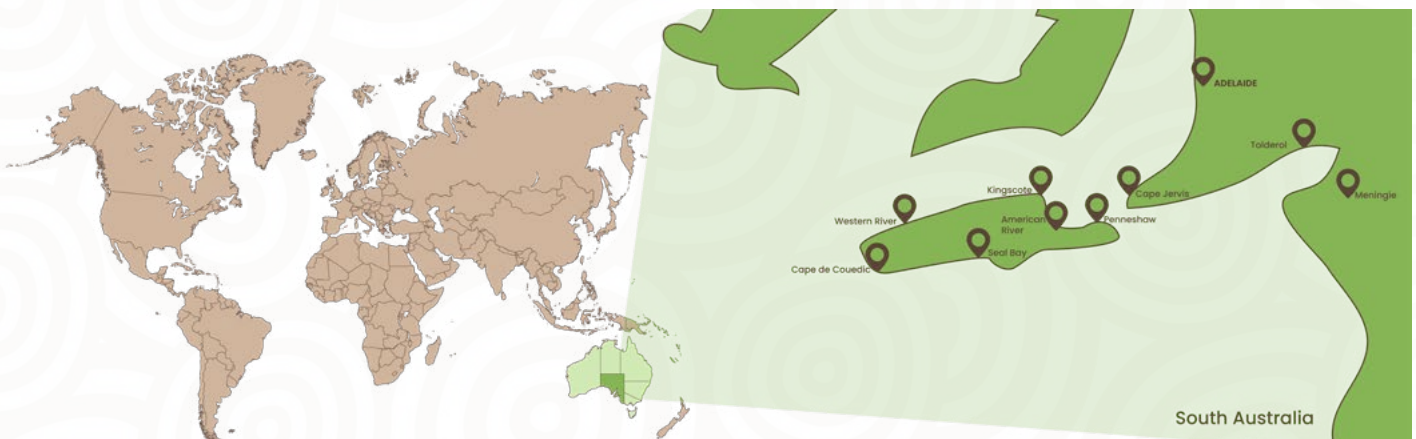

DIFFICULTY

Low level of fitness required. The tour has a relaxed pace, and walks are on varying surfaces, from paved roads to sandy or rocky walking trails with some short climbs. We generally walk slowly, with lots of stops. You can opt out of any challenging walks.

ACCOMMODATION

Private en-suite rooms in hotels or lodges. Standards of the lodgings are generally very comfortable. Expect slow, if any, wi-fi access.

CLOTHING

Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt, over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary, including a jumper / sweater and a wind- and rain-proof jacket.

WHAT TO BRING

Please travel light. Binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors if you're an international guest, insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, sun hat, water bottle, hand sanitizer. Sturdy footwear recommended. Scopes, super-telephoto lenses with tripods, and heavy suitcases are discouraged.
