

Slow-paced - Quality Lodgings - Good Food - We'll look after you - Mt. Isa to Adelaide

Comfortable Nine Grasswren Tour

29 June - 15 July 2028

This is a slow-paced version of our flagship Nine Grasswren tour, one of Australia's epic birding adventures. We will look for nine of Australia's 14 Grasswren species: Striated, Short-tailed, Western, Thick-billed, Eyrean, Grey, Kalkadoon, Carpenterian and Opalton Grasswren. From Adelaide we'll explore the vast 'Mallee' scrub and then head north. We travel the length of the Birdsville track, visit the stark country around Boulia-Winton, the scenic Flinders Ranges and finish in the rocky hills of Mt Isa. This trip is a real adventure (yet fully accommodated), taking it easy by adding an extra three days to the standard itinerary.

Timed to travel through the heart of the outback during the Austral winter season, we will have plenty of opportunity during these 16 days to see over 200 species, and besides the Grasswrens we have a good chance of many other sought-after birds. Accommodation will be of the best available standard; the drives have been shortened; the food will be of the best available, and where we have to take a picnic, it will be scrumptious. We have secured access to some new birding sites exclusively for this trip. The rewards are some of Australia's most sought-after outback species, wonderful scenery and great camaraderie.

ITINERARY

Day 0: 29 June 2028

Arrival in Mt. Isa

Make your own way to Mount Isa (Queensland), serviced by direct flights on Qantas, Virgin and Rex from Brisbane. You can get to the hotel by taxi (own cost) from the airport. We'll all meet this evening for dinner and introductions.

Overnight: Abacus Motel, en-suite motel room

Meals included: D

Day 1: 30 June 2028

Birding around Mt. Isa

We have a full day around Mt. Isa, where we'll be searching for two Grasswren species: Kalkadoon and Carpentarian. Another drawcard here is Painted Finch which we've seen on prior visits. We'll also spend time looking for other good species of the local area, including Spinifex Pigeon, Little Woodswallow, the 'Cloncurry' race of Australian Ringneck, Spinifexbird and Grey-headed Honeyeater, Black-tailed Treecreeper, Varied Lorikeet and many more. We'll also visit the sewage pond, with chance of Plumed Whistling Ducks and other waterfowl. Nearby at Lake Moondarra we have a good chance of Paperbark Flycatcher, Spotted Bowerbird, Plumed Whistling Duck, Painted Finch, Purple-necked Rock-wallaby and Freshwater Crocodile.

Overnight: Abacus Motel, en-suite motel rooms

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 2: 1 July 2028

Drive to Winton, dinosaur capital

The morning will be spent birding the local area, picking up any species we still need. We drive south, stopping for a leisurely lunch at Chinaman's Dam with waterfowl aplenty. From here we'll bird our way to the township of Winton, Australia's dinosaur capital. Species we're likely to encounter today include Australian Pratincole, Varied Lorikeet, Australian Bustard, Budgerigar, Brown and Rufous Songlark, Singing Bush Lark, Brolga, Black-tailed Nativehen, Plumed Whistling Duck and maybe even Ground Cuckooshrike. Before the day is over, we'll check a local waterhole for Plum-headed Finch, Baillon's Crake and whatever else may be around.

Overnight: Boulder Opal Motel, en-suite motel rooms

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 3: 2 July 2028

Bladensburg National Park

Traversing the area where Night Parrot has been recorded recently, travelling on dark red gravel roads, we notice more and more spinifex around us (with chances of Spinifexbird) until we arrive in the spinifex-covered plains around Lark Quarry. Here we search for Opalton Grasswren (former rowleyi subspecies of Striated). Other species we may come across include Grey Falcon, Rufous-crowned Emu-wren, Hall's Babbler, Chestnut-breasted Quail-thrush, Spinifexbird, White-browed, Dusky and Masked Woodswallow, Spinifex Pigeon, Grey-headed and Grey-fronted Honeyeater. We'll take lunch in the Dinosaur Trackways visitor centre, situated high up on a rugged jump-up plateau with spectacular views over the surrounding plains, while Spinifex Pigeons scurry around the surrounding undergrowth. Time permitting, there is the option for people to visit the dinosaur stampede fossils here this afternoon (own cost).

Overnight: Boulder Opal Motel, en-suite motel rooms

Day 4: 3 July 2028

Outback road to Boulia

Depending on what we've seen we'll head back into Bladensburg NP to pick up anything we've missed. We'll take a leisurely breakfast and check out the local waterhole for drinking parrots and finches, and any other key species we may have missed yesterday. We then travel on outback roads to the isolated township of Boulia, located in the heart of outback Queensland, with further chances of Chestnut-breasted Quail-thrush and along the way hopefully picking up Brolga, Australian Bustard and Inland Dotterel. Around sunset, we scout the grassy plains outside Boulia from the comfort of our vehicles for Flock Bronzewing coming in to drink.

Overnight: Boulia Sands Motel, en-suite hotel rooms

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 5: 4 July 2028

En route to Birdsville

We bird our way to Birdsville, checking local wetlands and sand dunes for species like Budgerigar, Cockatiel, Australian Bush-lark, Brolga, Bourke's Parrot and Ground Cuckooshrike, while we still have a chance of Flock Bronzewing and the highlight of today would be seeing our first Letter-winged Kite. We also have a good chance of Grey Falcon here. We'll have a meal at the famous Birdsville Pub tonight.

Overnight: Birdsville Hotel, en-suite hotel rooms

Day 6: 5 July 2028

Expedition on the Birdsville track

Today we'll set off onto the famous Birdsville track. An early morning expedition to search for Grey Grasswren should see us arrive at the site shortly after sunrise. These shy and localized birds' preferred habitat consists of dry swamps with lignum shrubs and saltbushes. We also have a good chance of Cinnamon Quail-thrush, Gibberbird, Inland Dotterel and with luck Grey Falcon and Letter-winged Kites. They don't nest each year, so fingers crossed! Next we'll bird various sites along the track heading south: species we've encountered here include Australian Pratincole and Flock Bronzewing. We'll visit a (usually dry) swamp where we have another chance of Grey Grasswren while the constant chatter of bird calls provides a background chorus. Continuing on the Birdsville track we'll bird our way south, hoping to pick up many other good outback bird species. Some time in the afternoon we'll arrive at our final destination for the day, Mungerannie, a charming, rustic outback pub surrounded by sand dunes (where Eyrean Grasswrens live) and wetlands, often rich in waterbirds.

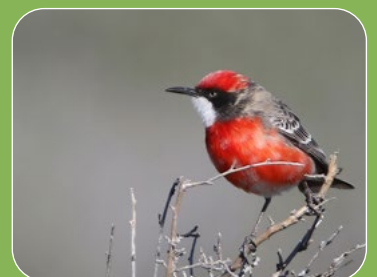

Day 7: 6 July 2028

Birding around Mungerannie

Today we'll have all day in the Mungerannie area in search of Grey Falcon, Black Falcon, Brown Songlark, Gibberbird, Orange and Crimson Chat, Budgerigar, Cockatiel, Inland Dotterel, Eyrean Grasswren, Thick-billed Grasswren, Chirruping Wedgebill, Pied Honeyeater, Diamond Dove and Cinnamon Quail-thrush. There will be time for a break in the afternoon before we do some final birding around sunset for Grey Falcon and Banded Whiteface.

Overnight: Mungerannie Pub, basic, clean rooms, some en-suite, some with shared bathroom facilities

Day 8: 7 July 2028**Birdsville track to Marree**

We'll check for Grey Falcon at first light and may see Flock Bronzewing heading for their early morning drink. Neighbouring Cowarie Station has resident Eyrean Grasswrens in the scenic sand dunes while along the Warburton River we often come across Red-browed Pardalote and Banded Whiteface. Crimson and Orange Chats are usually present too and on the gibber-strewn plains we look for Gibberbird. After lunch at Mungerrannie we continue driving the Birdsville track until we reach the township of Marree at the end of the day.

Overnight: Marree Hotel, a historical outback pub with modern en-suite rooms and facilities

Day 9: 8 July 2028**Searching for Thick-billed Grasswren**

The focus of this morning is the search for Thick-billed Grasswren, which inhabits the vast bluebush plains criss-crossed by usually dry creeks. Other good species we may come across are Cinnamon Quail-thrush, Rufous Fieldwren, Zebra Finch, Budgerigar, Red-backed Kingfisher and a chance of Inland Dotterel. After a lunch break at Marree we head a short distance north to an artesian bore overflow which has created a nice wetland which usually has Brolga and a raft of waterbirds, including cranes – in amidst desert-like scenery. Most years, Black-breasted Buzzard and Little Eagle breed here. Returning to Marree across the seemingly endless gibber-plains, we marvel at the vastness of the landscape, the clarity of the sky while the sun sets and Inland Dotterels come out to forage (if we're lucky...!).

Overnight: Marree Hotel, en-suite hotel-rooms

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 10: 9 July 2028**Through the Flinders Ranges**

Another chance of Thick-billed Grasswren this morning, and then after a leisurely breakfast we have a look at the local dam which often holds Freckled Duck, Pink-eared Duck, Black-tailed Nativehen, Australian Crake and White-backed Swallow. We'll pack up and head south, to the Flinders Ranges, an impressive range of soaring rock formations on the edge of the outback. This area of scenic beauty is home to plenty of wildlife including Red, Western Grey and Euro Kangaroos. As we travel along creek-beds and through narrow gorges cut deeply into geological layers that date back 800 million years we look for Chirruping

Wedgebill, Elegant Parrot, Grey-fronted Honeyeater and the rare Yellow-footed Rock-wallaby. We'll stay in Port Augusta, at the crossroads of outback Australia, where some of the best food of the trip awaits us.

Overnight: Port Augusta Standpipe Motel, en-suite motel rooms

Day 11: 10 July 2028

On the road to Mt. Ive

A pre-breakfast stroll around the golf course adjacent to the motel often yields Purple-crowned Lorikeet. After breakfast we pack up and search for Western Grasswren — formerly the myall race of Thick-billed, split around 15 years ago — which inhabits bluebush plains around Port Augusta.

Other birds we are likely to come across are the turquoise race of Splendid Fairy-wren, Black-eared Cuckoo and Redthroat, as well as Bluebonnet, Chirruping Wedgebill and Rufous Fieldwren. Later in the day we'll head into the Gawler Ranges, a little-explored rival to the Flinders Ranges, where we may be lucky to come across Mulga Parrot and Pink Cockatoo, but our main target here is the rare and localized, elusive Short-tailed Grasswren.

Overnight: Mt. Ive Station, en-suite rooms

Day 12: 11 July 2028

Mt. Ive and Arid Lands Botanical Gardens

Mt. Ive Station is strategically located in a scenic valley in the Gawler Ranges, from where both Western and Short-tailed Grasswren can be observed with some perseverance. We'll visit the amazingly scenic Lake Gairdner, a vast salt lake in the outback. After lunch we head back to Port Augusta, where we will further explore the well laid-out Arid Lands Botanical Gardens where Chirruping Wedgebill, White-fronted and Elegant Parrot may be seen while Banded Stilt often occur in a nearby salt lake.

Overnight: Port Augusta Standpipe Motel, en-suite motel rooms

Day 13: 12 July 2028

Mallee and the Murray river

The morning is a back-up for any other local species we may still need before we head south, looking for Slender-billed Thornbill and Adelaide

Rosella along the coast. Then we head inland until we reach Australia's largest river: the Murray. Lined with gnarly old Red Gum trees, the wetlands and floodplains along the river harbor a plethora of waterbirds such as ducks, herons, cormorants, rails, crakes and these often include sought-after species: Freckled Duck, Spotless Crake and Regent Parrot would be the highlight of the day.

In the afternoon we'll explore the southernmost parts of one of Australia's largest wilderness areas, over 1,000,000 ha of "mallee" eucalypt scrub of the Bookmark Biosphere — a conglomeration of nature reserves and pastoral properties. Here we have a chance of Gilbert's Whistler, Chestnut Quail-thrush, Striped Honeyeater and Purple-backed Fairy-wren. We'll stay at Berri on the banks of the Murray river.

Overnight: Berri Resort Hotel, en-suite hotel rooms

Day 14: 13 July 2028

Looking for Striated Grasswren around Berri

We'll be starting the day with our last Grasswren: the Striated, in the spinifex-mallee east of Berri, a beautiful and well-protected area of undisturbed mallee scrub. Other good birds possible in this area include Mallee Emu-wren, Southern Scrub Robin, Shy Heathwren, White-browed Treecreeper, and if we're lucky, Regent Parrot and Pink Cockatoo. Later in the afternoon we will check the vast bluebush plains for Redthroat, White-winged Fairy-wren and White-fronted Chat, while Little Friarbird, Blue-faced Honeyeater and Apostlebird are often found on the outskirts of town.

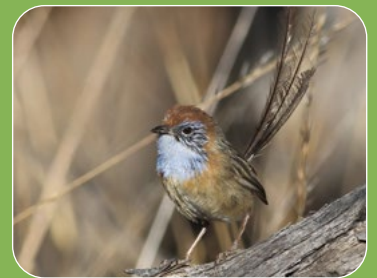
Overnight: Berri Resort Hotel, en-suite hotel rooms

Day 15: 14 July 2028

Murray river to Adelaide

We'll go for a stroll in the local area looking for Shy Heathwren, Redthroat, Striped Honeyeater, Splendid Fairy-wren, Chestnut Quail-thrush and Brown Treecreeper and then follow the Murray River south. Criss-crossing the scenic Mt Lofty Ranges we'll see plenty of Adelaide Rosellas, Crescent, Yellow-faced, Purple-gaped & Tawny-crowned Honeyeaters as well as Scarlet Robin, White-throated Treecreeper, Striated and Yellow Thornbill and we may be lucky to see the stately Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoos. Late in the afternoon we reluctantly arrive back in Adelaide for our final dinner and bird checklist.

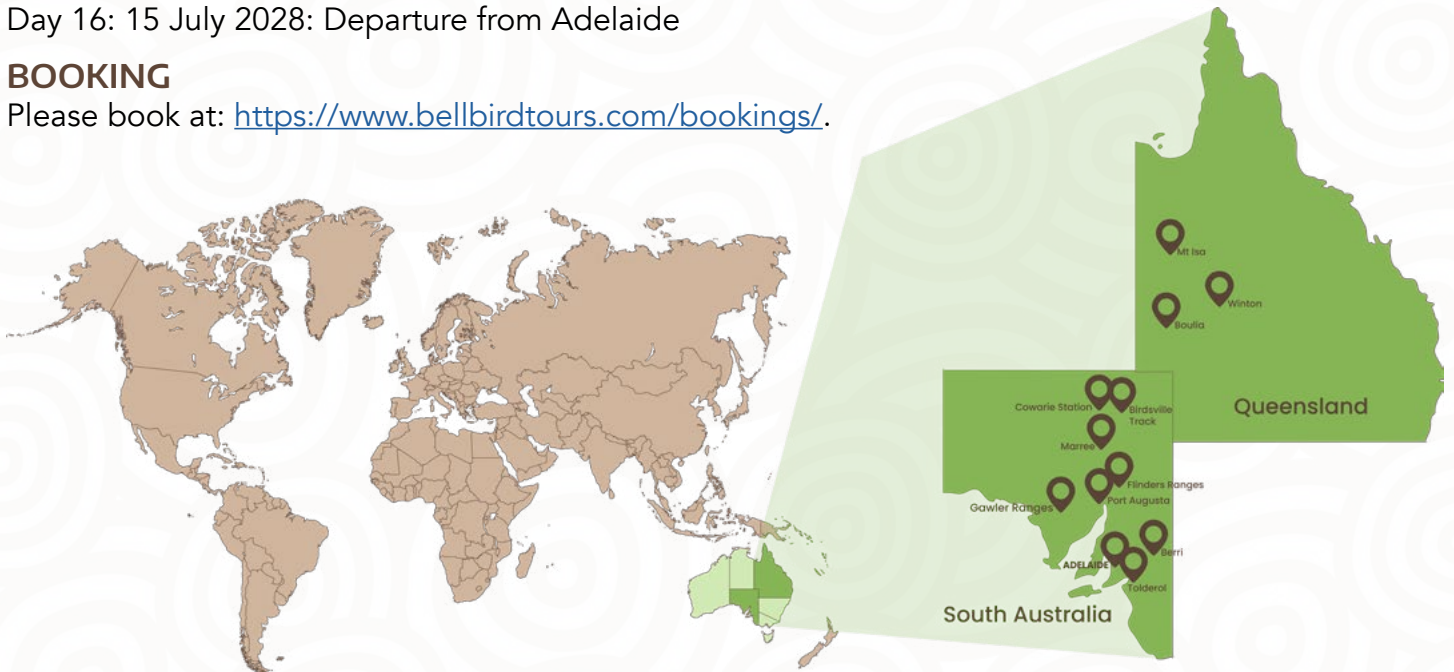

PRACTICAL DETAILS

LEADERS

Bellbird tour leader

DIFFICULTY

Medium level of fitness required. This trip is slower paced than our regular Grasswren tours. Walking in uneven terrain will still be required to find the birds, but we have secured access to some new and exclusive (and easier) sites. There will be some early departures or late finishes. You can opt out of any challenging activities if you like. While we will drive up to 4000 km (including approx. 1,000 km on unsealed roads of varying standard) this is spread out over 16 rather than 12 days. We can't control the weather but usually this time of year is fine, sunny and mild in the south to warmish in the north. We may encounter a frosty morning or an unseasonal rain downpour.

ACCOMMODATION

Private en-suite rooms in hotels, motels and cabins. Standards of lodgings are good to very comfortable. The two nights at Mungerannie there are some en-suite rooms, some with shared facilities. Most lodgings offer wi-fi access. Mobile (cell) phone reception is limited (Telstra is best) to often non-existent.

CLOTHING

Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt, over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary, including a warm jumper and a rain-proof jacket. Neat casual attire for dinners. Be prepared for the occasional cold morning but often gloriously sunny days.

WHAT TO BRING

Please travel light; Binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors if you're an international guest, insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, sun hat, water bottle, hand sanitizer. Scopes, tripods, huge tele-photo lenses, and hard-cased heavy suitcases are discouraged.
