

Slow-paced - Quality Lodgings - Good Food - We'll look after you - Adelaide to Mt. Isa

Comfortable Nine Grasswren Tour

17 July - 2 August 2028

This is a slow-paced version of our flagship Nine Grasswren tour, one of Australia's epic birding adventures. We will look for nine of Australia's 14 Grasswren species: Striated, Short-tailed, Western, Thick-billed, Eyrean, Grey, Kalkadoon, Carpenterian and Opalton Grasswren. From Adelaide we'll explore the vast 'Mallee' scrub and then head north. We travel the length of the Birdsville track, visit the stark country around Boulia-Winton, the scenic Flinders Ranges and finish in the rocky hills of Mt Isa. This trip is a real adventure (yet fully accommodated), taking it easy by adding an extra three days to the standard itinerary.

Timed to travel through the heart of the outback during the Austral winter season, we will have plenty of opportunity during these 16 days to see over 200 species, and besides the Grasswrens we have a good chance of many other sought-after birds. Accommodation will be of the best available standard; the drives have been shortened; the food will be of the best available, and where we have to take a picnic, it will be scrumptious. We have secured access to some new birding sites exclusively for this trip. The rewards are some of Australia's most sought-after outback species, wonderful scenery and great camaraderie.

ITINERARY

Day 0: 17 July 2028

Arrival in Adelaide

Make your own way to Adelaide, South Australia. In the evening we'll meet at the hotel for dinner and introductions.

Overnight: Hotel in Adelaide, en-suite hotel room

Meals included: D

Day 1: 18 July 2028

Adelaide to the Riverlands

We'll start our day exploring the scenic Adelaide hills, where we'll see plenty of Adelaide Rosellas, Crescent, Yellow-faced, Purple-gaped & Tawny-crowned Honeyeaters as well as Scarlet Robin, White-throated Treecreeper, Striated and Yellow Thornbill. We may be lucky to see the stately Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoos. At a small but excellent wetland we'll look for Australian Spotted and Spotless Crake. We'll also check the shores of Lake Alexandrina for Cape Barren Geese, waterbirds and waders. After lunch we head to the Riverland area of South Australia, for our accommodation, dinner and bird checklist.

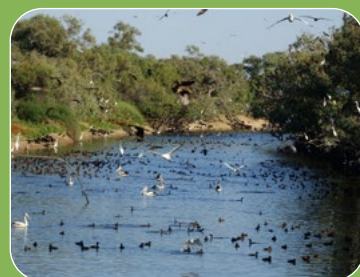
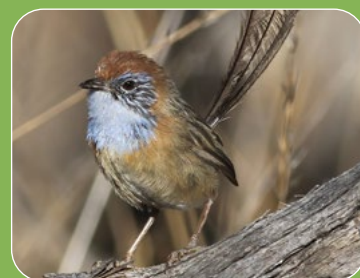
Day 2: 19 July 2028

Birding around Berri and Murray river

We'll be starting the day with our first Grasswren: the Striated, in the spinifex-mallee just east of Berri, a beautiful and well-protected area of undisturbed mallee scrub. Other good birds possible in this area include Mallee Emu-wren, Chestnut Quail-thrush, Southern Scrub Robin, Shy Heathwren, White-browed Treecreeper, and if we're lucky, Regent Parrot and Pink Cockatoo. Later in the afternoon we will check the vast Bluebush plains for Redthroat, White-winged Fairy-wren and White-fronted Chat. After lunch we will explore Australia's largest river: the Murray. Lined with gnarly old Red Gum trees, the wetlands and floodplains along the river harbor a plethora of waterbirds such as ducks, herons, cormorants, rails, crakes and these often include sought-after species: Freckled Duck, Spotless Crake, Little Friarbird and Regent Parrot would be the highlight of the day.

Day 3: 20 July 2028

Mallee and Bluebush plains to Port Augusta

The morning will be spent exploring one of Australia's largest wilderness areas, over 1,000,000 ha of "mallee" eucalypt scrub of the Bookmark Biosphere — a conglomeration of nature reserves and pastoral properties. Here we have a chance of the elusive Chestnut Quail-thrush and the ultra-rare Red-lored Whistler. We can pick up any mallee species we still need such as Striped Honeyeater, Splendid Fairy-wren, Southern Scrub Robin and more. We'll have lunch in one of the pretty little historic copper-mining townships of the region before we head further north, exploring the vast Bluebush plains looking for Redthroat, Inland Thornbill and Adelaide Rosella. At Port Augusta, we explore the well laid-out Arid Lands Botanical Gardens where Chirruping Wedgebill, White-fronted Honeyeater and Elegant Parrot may be seen. We'll stay in Port Augusta, at the crossroads of outback Australia. Some of the best food of the trip awaits us here!

Overnight: Port Augusta Standpipe Motel, en-suite motel rooms

Day 4: 21 July 2028

Port Augusta to Mt. Ive

A pre-breakfast stroll around the golf course adjacent to the motel often yields Purple-crowned Lorikeet. After breakfast we pack up and search for Western Grasswren — formerly the myall race of Thick-billed, split around 15 years ago — which inhabits Bluebush plains around Port Augusta. Other birds we are likely to come across are the turquoise race of Splendid Fairy-wren, Black-eared Cuckoo and Redthroat, as well as Bluebonnet, Chirruping Wedgebill and Rufous Fieldwren. Later in the day we'll head into the Gawler Ranges, a little-explored rival to the Flinders Ranges, where we may be lucky to come across Mulga Parrot and Pink Cockatoo, but our main target here is the rare and localized Short-tailed Grasswren.

Overnight: Mt. Ive Station, en-suite hotel rooms

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 5: 22 July 2028

Mt. Ive and Arid Lands Botanical Gardens

Mt. Ive Station is strategically located in a scenic valley in the Gawler Ranges, from where both Western and Short-tailed Grasswren can be observed with a bit of perseverance. We'll visit the amazingly scenic Lake Gairdner, a vast salt lake in the outback. After lunch we head back to Port Augusta, and we will further explore the well laid-out Arid Lands Botanical Gardens where Chirruping Wedgebill, White-fronted

Honey-eater and Elegant Parrot may be seen while Banded Stilts often occur in a nearby salt lake.

Overnight: Port Augusta Standpipe Motel, en-suite motel rooms

Day 6: 23 July 2028

Through the Flinders Ranges to Marree

This morning we make an early departure for the Flinders Ranges, an impressive range of soaring rock formations on the edge of the outback. This area of scenic beauty is home to plenty of Red, Western Grey and Euro Kangaroos which we'll no doubt see plenty of. As we travel along creek-beds and through narrow gorges cut deeply into geological layers that date back 800 million years, we look for Chirruping Wedgebill, Elegant Parrot, Grey-fronted Honeyeater, Inland Thornbill, Redthroat, and the rare Yellow-footed Rock-wallaby. At the old coalmine of Leigh Creek, we check a freshwater lake for Blue-billed, Freckled and Musk Ducks before we arrive at Marree, a sleepy outback hamlet where we marvel at the vastness of the landscape, the clarity of the sky while the sun sets and if we're really lucky, Inland Dotterels come out to forage. As we'll be here for two nights, there's time to relax, do your laundry or download your photos.

Overnight: Marree Hotel, a historical outback pub with modern en-suite rooms

Day 7: 24 July 2028

Birding around Marree

The focus of this morning is the search for Thick-billed Grasswren, which inhabits the vast Bluebush plains criss-crossed by usually dry creeks. Other good species we may come across are Cinnamon Quail-thrush, Rufous Fieldwren, Zebra Finch, Budgerigar, Red-backed Kingfisher and a chance of Inland Dotterel. After a lunch break at Marree we head a short distance north to an artesian bore overflow which has created a nice wetland which usually holds Brolga and a raft of water-birds, including crakes, in amidst desert-like scenery. Most years, Black-breasted Buzzard and Little Eagle breed here.

Overnight: Marree Hotel, en-suite hotel rooms

Day 8: 25 July 2028

Birdsville track to Mungerannie

We'll head up the famous Birdsville track early, checking for Grey Falcon at various spots, and we may see Flock Bronzewing heading for their early morning drink. We'll check a few creek crossings for Red-browed Pardalote, Orange Chat and Brolga. After a picnic lunch at a scenic spot we head to the Mungerannie pub to check the adjacent watercourse. The very scenic sand dune behind the water holds Eyrean Grasswren and we'll make our first attempt at them this afternoon.

Overnight: Mungerannie Pub, a charming, rustic outback pub with basic, clean rooms, some en-suite, some with shared bathroom facilities

Day 9: 26 July 2028

Birdsville and Cowarie Station

A big day birding the Birdsville track area and neighbouring Cowarie Station, which has resident Eyrean Grasswrens in the scenic sand dunes while along the Warburton River we often come across Red-browed Pardalote and Banded Whiteface. Crimson and Orange Chats are usually present and on the gibber-strewn plains we look for Gibberbird. Other species we've encountered here are Grey Falcon, Australian Pratincole and Flock Bronzewing. After a sumptuous picnic lunch at a scenic spot, we start making our way back towards Mungerannie, hopefully picking up Gibberbird, Banded Whiteface, Cinnamon Quail-thrush and Inland Dotterel on the way.

Overnight: Mungerannie Pub, hotel-rooms, some en-suite, some with shared bathroom facilities

Day 10: 27 July 2028

Birdsville swamps, wetlands and dunes

A very early departure to head north to arrive at a (sometimes dry) swamp not long after sunrise. Here the constant chatter of bird calls provides a background chorus to our search for Grey Grasswren which prefers the dense lignum shrubs in the foreground. We have a good chance of Grey Falcon. If necessary we have another chance at Grey Grasswren at another location later this morning, otherwise we bird our way around Birdsville, checking local wetlands and sand dunes for species like Budgerigar, Cockatiel, Australian Bush-lark, Inland Dotterel, Brolga, Red-browed Pardalote and more, while we still have a chance of Flock Bronzewing and perhaps our first Letter-winged Kite. Dinner will be in the iconic Birdsville pub tonight.

Day 11: 28 July 2028

Heading north to Boulia

A relaxed breakfast followed by some birding around Birdsville to pick up anything we still need, then we pack up and head north. We have a good chance of Letter-winged Kites today (but they don't nest each year) as well as Grey Falcon. We'll have our first chance of Spinifex Pigeon once we get closer to Boulia. Along the way we check for Black-breasted Buzzard, Australian Bustard, Australian Pratincole and once at Boulia, Brolga, Grey-crowned Babbler, various woodswallows and a Spotted Bowerbird at its bower. Around sunset we will scout the grassy plains from the comfort of our vehicles to check for Flock Bronze-wings coming in to drink.

Day 12: 29 July 2028

Spinifex-covered plains to Winton

An early departure as we'll be traversing the area where Night Parrot has been recorded recently. Travelling on dark red gravel roads we notice more and more spinifex around us (with chances of Spinifexbird) until we arrive in the spinifex-covered plains around Opalton. Here we search for Opalton Grasswren (was recently split off from Striated). Other species we may come across include Rufous-crowned Emu-wren, Spinifexbird, White-browed, Dusky and Masked Woodswallow, Spinifex Pigeon and Grey-fronted Honeyeater. We then travel to the township of Winton, Australia's dinosaur capital.

Overnight: Boulder Opal Motel, en-suite motel rooms

Day 13: 30 July 2028

Bladensburg NP and dinosaur fossils

A back-up morning for Opalton Grasswren. Birding/exploring the Bladensburg National Park we'll also look for Bourke's Parrot, Hall's Babbler, Chestnut-breasted Quail-thrush and Spinifexbird. We'll take lunch in the Dinosaur Trackways visitor centre, situated high up on a rugged jump-up plateau with spectacular views over the surrounding plains, while Spinifex Pigeons scurry around the surrounding undergrowth. Time permitting, there is the option for people to visit the dinosaur stampede fossils here this afternoon (own cost).

Overnight: Boulder Opal Motel, en-suite motel rooms

Day 14: 31 July 2028

North to Mt. Isa

The morning will be spent birding the local area, picking up any species we may have missed. Options include the local sewage ponds (we've seen Plum-headed Finch here on many occasions) and then we start heading north. Along the way we'll pull in at the iconic Crocodile Dundee hotel for a look and/or a coffee, and next, the township of Cloncurry, where we may find the 'Cloncurry' race of Australian Ringneck. We're also likely to encounter birds such as Varied Lorikeet, Australian Bustard, Budgerigar, Brown and Rufous Songlark, Brolga, Black-tailed Nativehen, Plumed Whistling Duck and maybe even Ground Cuckooshrike today.

Overnight: Abacus Motel, en-suite motel rooms
 Meals included: B, L, D

Day 15: 1 August 2028

Birding around Mt. Isa

A full day around Mt. Isa, to search for two Grasswren species: Kalkadoon and Carpentarian. Another drawcard here is Painted Finch which we see regularly here. We'll also spend time looking for other good species of the local area, including Spinifex Pigeon, Little Woodswallow, the 'Cloncurry' race of Australian Ringneck, Spinifexbird and Grey-headed Honeyeater, Black-tailed Treecreeper, Varied Lorikeet and many more. We'll visit the sewage pond, with chance of Plumed Whistling Ducks and other waterfowl. Nearby at Lake Moondarra we have a good chance of Paperbark Flycatcher, Spotted Bowerbird, Plumed Whistling Duck, Painted Finch, Glossy Ibis, Comb-crested Jacana, Purple-necked Rock-wallaby and Freshwater Crocodile.

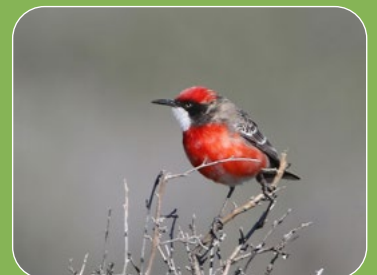
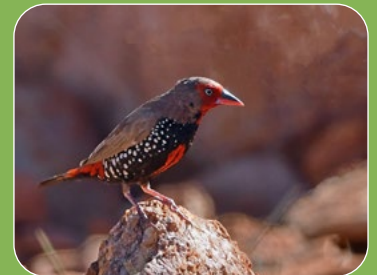

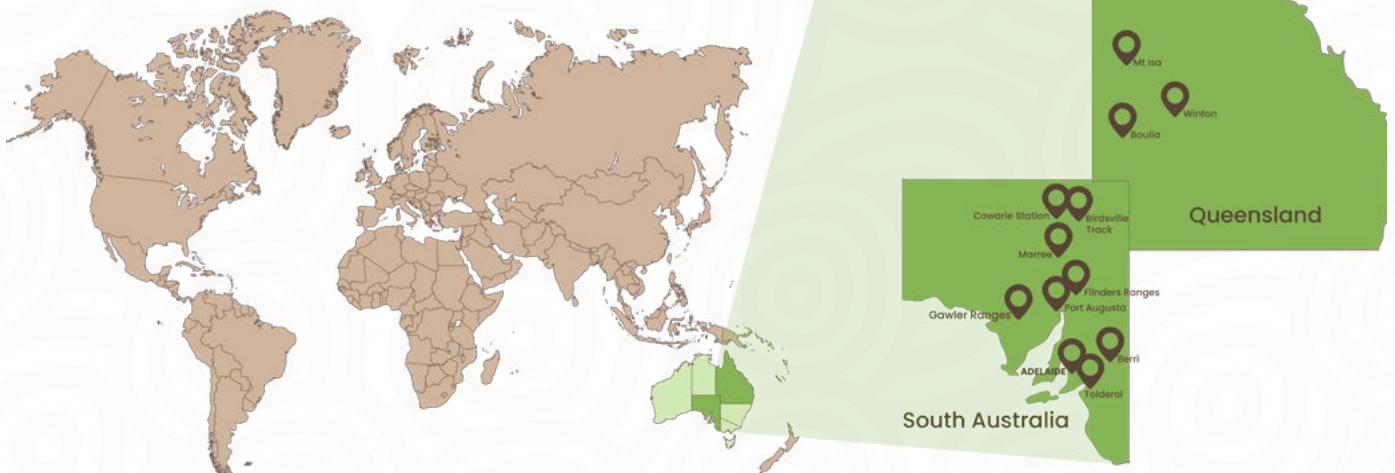

LEADERS

Bellbird tour leader

DIFFICULTY

Medium level of fitness required. This trip is slower paced than our regular Grasswren tours. Walking in uneven terrain will still be required to find the birds, but we have secured access to some new and exclusive (and easier) sites. There will be some early departures or late finishes. You can opt out of any challenging activities if you like. While we will drive up to 4000 km (including approx. 1,000 km on unsealed roads of varying standard) this is spread out over 16 rather than 12 days. We can't control the weather but usually this time of year is fine, sunny and mild in the south to warmish in the north. We may encounter a frosty morning or an unseasonal rain downpour.

ACCOMMODATION

Private en-suite rooms in hotels, motels and cabins. Standards of lodgings are good to very comfortable. The two nights at Mungerannie there are some en-suite rooms, some with shared facilities. Most lodgings offer wi-fi access. Mobile (cell) phone reception is limited (Telstra is best) to often non-existent.

CLOTHING

Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt, over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary, including a warm jumper and a rain-proof jacket. Neat casual attire for dinners. Be prepared for the occasional cold morning but often gloriously sunny days.

WHAT TO BRING

Please travel light; Binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors if you're an international guest, insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, sun hat, water bottle, hand sanitizer. Scopes, tripods, huge tele-photo lenses, and hard-cased heavy suitcases are discouraged.
