

Great Southern Tour

1 - 16 April 2028

This exciting tour specifically concentrates on the many specialties of the southern regions of Australia, parts of the outback and the great inland rivers. An optional extension to Tasmania is available. During the main tour we are likely to find over 250 species and experience an amazing variety of landscapes and habitats, including outback mountains and deserts, vast expanses of eucalypt scrubland at Birds Australia's Gluepot Reserve, wetlands and rivers including Australia's greatest river, the Murray, spectacular coastal areas including the famous Great Ocean Road and tall, dense eucalypt forests. The trip includes some of Australia's hardest to find, yet most sought-after

species, including grasswrens, Plains-wanderer, Superb Lyrebird, Satin Bowerbird, whistlers, quail-thrushes, many parrots including Regent and Superb, 4 species of Fairywren, many raptors and waterbirds, Malleefowl and much, much more. This tour strikes a perfect balance between maximising the species count and the number of days on the road plus the option to join the preceding Tasmania tour. Mammals also won't be forgotten with Koala, Wombat, 5 species of macropod including the endangered Yellow-footed Rock-wallaby, Echidna and other species possible. Join us on this annual tour which is now in its 17th season!

ITINERARY

Day 0: 1 April 2028

Arrival in Adelaide

From 25 March to 1 April, you can join our Tasmania trip, which finishes in Hobart on 1 April, after which you can make your way to Adelaide in time for dinner. See <https://www.bellbirdtours.com/tasmania/>.

People not joining this trip will make their own way to our hotel on 1 April in Adelaide, where we'll all meet this evening for dinner and introductions.

Day 1: 2 April 2028

Adelaide to Lyndhurst

We'll follow the coast north, looking for coastal birds, the Adelaide race of Crimson Rosella and the localised Slender-billed Thornbill. In the bush around Mt Remarkable we should see our first Australian Ringneck, various Honeyeater species and possibly Horsfield's Bronze-cuckoo. At Port Augusta we visit the scenic Arid Lands Botanical Gardens with its White-winged Fairywrens, Zebra Finches and Chirruping Wedgebills, as well as many species of Honeyeater. A nearby coastal lake often has Banded Stilt. We'll travel past the Flinders Ranges and check a site for Rufous Fieldwren. Our final destination, the hamlet of Lyndhurst, is located on the edge of the vast outback. The local hotel is nothing more than a typical outback pub with basic facilities but lots of character.

Day 2: 3 April 2028

Lyndhurst and the Strzelecki desert

Around Lyndhurst, on the edge of the Strzelecki desert, every year is different as seasonal conditions dictate what species are around in this harsh outback environment. We bird for species such as Cinnamon Quail-thrush, Inland Dotterel, Chirruping Wedgebill and Rufous Fieldwren. With much luck and perseverance, we may see the elusive Thick-billed Grasswren here. We'll explore the endless open stony plains of the Strzelecki desert which are traversed by dry watercourses. Expect species such as Budgerigar, Red-backed Kingfisher, Crimson, Orange and Gibber Chat. We'll have a picnic lunch at a waterhole, then bird our

way back to Lyndhurst, looking for Inland Dotterel and Black-breasted Buzzard.

Day 3: 4 April 2028

Gammon Ranges

Today we travel south past the scenic Gammon Ranges to check a lake for Orange Chats on the shore and many waterbirds (chance of Blue-billed and Freckled Ducks). Once we enter the Flinders Ranges, an impressive range of steep hills and soaring rock formations on the edge of Australia's outback, the landscape changes dramatically. Here we proceed along creekbeds and through narrow gorges cut deeply into geological layers that date back 800 million years, while searching for Elegant Parrot and Grey-fronted Honeyeater. We visit the fossil site of the Ediacaran fauna, which lived a little before the great explosion of multicellular life at the beginning of the Cambrian Period. We're also likely to encounter the endangered Yellow-footed Rock-wallaby. We will certainly see plenty of Red, Western Grey and Euro Kangaroos. We'll retire to our luxurious base at Wilpena Pound Resort for dinner and a spotlighting walk that may yield Tawny Frogmouth, Australian Owlet-nightjar or Australian Boobook.

Day 4: 5 April 2028

Flinders Ranges

Early mornings in the outback can get a bit chilly as we check rocky outcrops for Southern Scrub Robin, Black-eared Cuckoo, Red-capped & Hooded Robin and Inland Thornbill. We then leave the picturesque Flinders Ranges and drive south, through the historic copper mining township of Burra, and search Bluebush plains for Redthroat, Brown & Rufous Songlark and White-winged Fairywren. Later in the day we reach Australia's largest river: the Murray, where we check the wetlands for crakes, rails and waterbirds including Pink-eared and with luck, the rare Freckled Duck.

Day 5: 6 April 2028

Mallee wilderness reserves

We depart early in the morning for a drive of about an hour to one

of the many 'mallee' wilderness reserves which includes Murray Sunset National Park, Birdlife Australia's Gluepot, Calperum Station and others, arriving around sunrise. While the sun rises over centuries-old mallee eucalypts and sand dunes covered in spinifex grass, we look for Red-lored Whistler, Australian Golden Whistler, Hooded Robin, Southern Scrub Robin, Mallee Emuwren, Striated Grasswren, Shy Heathwren and White-browed Treecreeper. As the bird activity slows down, so do we, and focus on species such as Purple-backed & Splendid Fairywren, Mulga Parrot and Striped Honeyeater. Depending on conditions we may also find White-winged Triller, Pied Honeyeater and Crimson Chat. We leave the reserve late afternoon to return to our accommodation around dusk.

Day 6: 7 April 2028

Murray River National Park to Ouyen

The morning is spent in the Murray River National Park with its vast tracts of the unique River Red Gum forests. Flowering eucalypts produce an abundance of nectar for honeyeaters and parrots. Focus of the morning is the endangered Regent Parrot: we'll visit a colony of these beautiful birds while other species we aim to find include Yellow Rosella, Restless Flycatcher, crakes and rails and Nankeen Night Heron. Another target for this morning, should we haven't seen it yet, is the subtly beautiful ground-dwelling Chestnut Quail-thrush. After lunch we head east, checking various sites along the way (with a chance of up to 5 species of raptors), to the township of Ouyen.

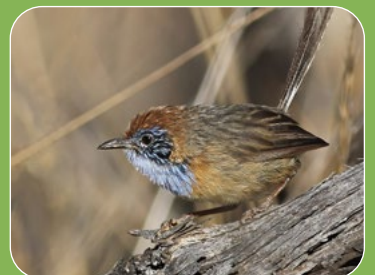

Day 7: 8 April 2028

Hattah-Kulkyne National Park

Today we head off early to arrive at Hattah-Kulkyne National Park with its vast expanses of Mallee (eucalypt) scrubland with Spinifex (porcupine) grass in time to search for the endangered Mallee Emu-wren. These elusive yet beautiful birds will take some time to track down, but in the process, we stand a good chance of coming across Pink Cockatoo and more Regent Parrots. In the afternoon we travel to Deniliquin; after checking into our rooms, we'll set off again for further birding and after dark, spotlighting for Plains-wanderer. The species, in a family of its own, is almost extinct. The birds are rarely seen during the day and therefore the evening will be spent searching for them using spotlights. During this session we may also see Inland Dotterel, Singing Bush Lark,

Eastern Barn Owl, and Stubble Quail.

Day 8: 9 April 2028

Woodlands and waterways of Deniliquin

After our late-night adventures, we'll start not too early in the morning, birding the riverine woodlands and waterways around Deniliquin. Species targeted during the day include Superb Parrot and Black Falcon; a raft of woodland species including chance of Western Gerygone, Buff-rumped Thornbill, Crested Shrike-tit, White-throated Treecreeper, Diamond Firetail, Grey-crowned Babbler and Gilbert's Whistler; waterbirds which are subject to seasonal fluctuations but may include Wandering Whistling Duck, White-necked Heron, Australian and Spotless Crake, and depending on seasonal conditions White-fronted/Painted/ Pied/ Black Honeyeaters.

Day 9: 10 April 2028

Deniliquin to Chiltern

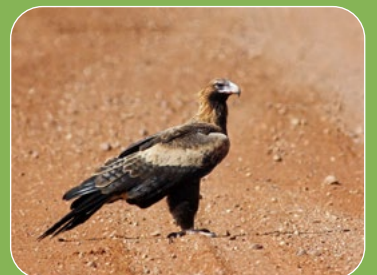
Australasian Bittern and Black-backed Bittern are the targets for this morning, although we'll most likely hear them, seeing them will be difficult. Afterwards we drive east and visit various woodland sites along the way, with further chances of birds like Eastern Spinebill, Diamond Firetail, Speckled Warbler, Black-chinned, Fuscous & Yellow-tufted Honeyeater, Flame, Scarlet & Eastern Yellow Robins, White-bellied Cuckoo-shrike, Pallid Cuckoo, Little & Musk Lorikeets, Oriental Dollarbird, Satin Flycatcher, etc, before reaching the woodlands of Chiltern, home to an amazing variety of new birds, right outside our rooms.

Day 10: 11 April 2028

Chiltern National Park

We'll spend most of the day exploring the woodlands of Chiltern NP, home to the endangered Turquoise Parrot, Speckled Warbler, Yellow-tufted Honeyeater, Eastern Yellow Robin, Crested Shrike-tit, Painted Honeyeater, Diamond Firetail and many more. In the afternoon we head south for a couple of hours' drive to Healesville, scenically located in the Yarra Ranges east of Melbourne. We'll make a couple of short walks

looking for Bassian Thrush, Rufous Fantail, Red-browed Treecreeper and Gang-gang Cockatoo.

Day 11: 12 April 2028

Moist forest around Healesville

We spend most of the day birding the moist hill forests around Healesville, containing the tallest flowering trees in the world, with an under-story of tree ferns. Here we hope to pick up Superb Lyrebird, Pilotbird, Red-browed & White-throated Treecreepers, Large-billed & White-browed Scrub-wrens, Eastern Whipbird, Rufous Fantail, Satin Flycatcher, Australian Golden Whistler, Lewin's Honeyeater, Pied Currawong, Sahul Brush Cuckoo, Brown & Striated Thornbill and Silvereye. In the evening, we'll do a bout of spotlighting with chances of Australian Boobook, Tawny Frogmouth, Sooty Owl and White-throated Nightjar.

Day 12: 13 April 2028

Healesville to Geelong

A backup morning for anything we still need in the fabulous hill forests surrounding Healesville. We'll then drive for a couple of hours to the town of Geelong, gateway to our destination for the next morning: the Western Treatment Plant. Pulling into the You Yang Ranges, a series of hills covered in dry woodland, we'll look for Spotted Pardalote, Red-capped Robin, Yellow-rumped and Chestnut-rumped Thornbill, Jacky Winter, Little Bronze Cuckoo and woodswallows.

Day 13: 14 April 2028

Avalon Beach

We'll head to Avalon Beach and the adjacent Western Treatment Plant, one of Australia's premier waterbird sites, looking for Sharp-tailed Sandpiper, Red-necked Stint, Black-tailed Godwit, Red Knot, Red-capped Plover, Hoary-headed Grebe, Australasian Gannet, Pied, Little Pied, Great & Little Black Cormorants, White-winged Tern, Fairy Tern, Pink-eared, Blue-billed and Musk Duck, Australian Shelduck, Cape Barren Goose, Red-necked Avocet, Australian Crake, Buff-banded Rail, Blue-winged Parrot, Striated Fieldwren, Singing Bush Lark, Horsfield's Bronze

Cuckoo, Golden-headed Cisticola, Cape Barren Goose, Swamp Harrier and Black Falcon. We'll also check out the adjacent dry woodlands where we hope to pick up the last of our dry woodland specialists such as Varied Sittella, Diamond Firetail and White-winged Chough.

Day 14: 15 April 2028

Scenic Great Ocean Road

After an early breakfast in the cute coastal township of Anglesea we make our way around the spectacularly scenic Great Ocean Road, looking for birds such as Rufous Bristlebird, Southern Emu-wren, Gang-gang Cockatoo, Yellow-tailed Black Cockatoo, Satin Bowerbird, Blue-winged Parrot, Australian King Parrot, Olive Whistler, Tawny-crowned, Yellow-faced & Crescent Honeyeaters, Forest Raven, Fan-tailed Cuckoo, Rose Robin, Bassian Thrush, Grey Goshawk, Brush Bronzewing, Black-faced Cormorant, Hooded Plover, Striated Fieldwren, seabirds, etc. as well as Koala and Swamp Wallaby.

LEADERS

Bellbird leader.

DIFFICULTY

Low to medium level of fitness required. The tour has a relaxed pace, and walks are on varying surfaces, from paved roads to sandy or rocky walking trails with some short climbs. We generally walk slowly, with lots of stops. You can opt out of any challenging walks.

ACCOMMODATION

Private en-suite rooms in hotels or lodges. Standards of the lodgings are generally very comfortable. Expect slow, if any, wi-fi access.

CLOTHING

Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt, over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary, including a jumper / sweater and a wind- and rain-proof jacket.

WHAT TO BRING

Please travel light. Binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors if you're an international guest, insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, sun hat, water bottle, hand sanitizer. Sturdy footwear recommended. Scopes, super-telephoto lenses with tripods, and heavy suitcases are discouraged.
