



Tropical & Far North Queensland

3 - 12 July 2028

Tropical Far North Queensland is without doubt one of Australia's top birding destinations. A variety of tropical habitats including rainforests, palm-fringed beaches, mangrove-lined mudflats, savannahs and cool mountain ranges result in a bird diversity unparalleled elsewhere in the country.

Commencing in fabulous Iron Range NP, we'll traverse Cape York birding all the way to Artemis Station before we head to well-known Chambers Wildlife Lodge on the Atherton Tablelands. During this tour we aim to find all Tropical Far North Queensland specialties. Expect over 200 species including all the endemics and other important birds this area is well-known for such

as Magnificent Riflebird, Frill-necked Monarch, Blue-faced Parrotfinch, Lovely Fairy-wren, White-streaked Honeyeater, Papuan Frogmouth, nesting Red Goshawks, Palm Cockatoo, Eclectus Parrot, Yellow-billed Kingfisher and many more, including of course the rare Southern Cassowary.

We'll have rare access to Golden-shouldered Parrot nesting sites; explore the Lakefield region; we'll go night spotting for owls and mammals; and we'll spend two days in the Iron Range rainforests, one of Australia's most important ecosystems. We'll also look for mammals such as Bandicoot, Sugar Glider, Northern Striped Possum, Red-necked Wallaby and Tree Kangaroo. Read on below for the full itinerary and checklist!

Itinerary

Day 0: 3 July 2028 Cairns to Lockhart

Please make your own way to Cairns from where you will catch a flight to Lockhart River (not included in price; approx. AU\$660; we will book at group rates and add to your bill). (Please liaise with us regarding flight times before booking travel into Cairns). Upon arrival in Lockhart our guide will pick you up and transfer you to our accommodation (included) where we will meet for dinner and introductions. Time permitting we'll do some introductory birding this afternoon or evening.

Overnight: The Greenhouse, mostly en-suite rooms

Days 1 & 2: 4 & 5 July 2028 Iron Range

We'll spend two full days in the rainforests of the Iron Range, one of Australia's premier and unique ecosystems. From tall forest to heath to coastal bush, Iron Range has a diversity of habitat, and a range of wildlife found nowhere else on the planet. We target gems such as Marbled Frogmouth, Large-tailed Nightjar, Yellow-billed Kingfisher, Red-cheeked Parrot, Brown Booby, a variety of Terns, Black-eared Catbird, Fawn-breasted Bowerbird, Green-backed Honeyeater, Grey Whistler, Northern Scrub Robin, Magnificent Riflebird, Trumpet Manucode, Tawny-breasted and White-streaked Honeyeater, White-eared and Frill-necked Monarch, Lemon-bellied and Yellow-legged Flycatcher, White-faced Robin, Lovely Fairywren and the highly sought-after Palm Cockatoo and Eclectus Parrot and many more. At some stage we head to the other side of the Iron Range and adjacent coasts, around the scenic settlement of Portland Roads. Here we'll search for Spotted Whistling Duck, Tropical Scrubwren, Double-eyed Fig Parrot, Mangrove Robin, Eclectus Parrot, Frill-necked Monarch, Fawn-breasted Bowerbird, Green-backed and Varied Honeyeaters plus any birds we may have missed earlier. We'll spend two full days exploring this magnificent region and will check the roads and forest at night for Common Spotted Cuscus and other nocturnal mammals before returning to our accommodation.

Overnight: The Greenhouse, mostly en-suite rooms

Day 3: 6 July 2028 Mount Tozer and Archer River

A final morning birding the rainforests of Iron Range picking up any species still needed and no doubt seeing more of the species we've

seen on previous days. A stop at Mount Tozer lookout has a large variety of heathland plants including Pitcher-Plant, Banksia, Silky Oak, and Grass Trees. We will look here specifically for White-streak Honeyeater and then it's time to head south on Cape York Peninsula. We'll make a stop at Archer River Roadhouse with its resident Great Bowerbirds and depending on what's flowering, White-throated Honeyeater, Graceful Honeyeater, and Yellow Honeyeater. Once we arrive at our accommodation we will explore the grounds to see what birds we can find which will likely include Blue-winged Kookaburra, Peaceful Dove, Yellow Oriole, and Pied Butcherbird.

Overnight: Musgrave Roadhouse, en-suite rooms

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 4: 7 July 2028

Lakefield National Park

A full day to explore the fantastic Lakefield National Park. A mix of habitats from grassy plains to mangrove lined rivers, savannah woodlands and scattered waterholes should add several finches including Black-throated, Masked and Start as well as the White-bellied subspecies of Crimson Finch. Other species we will see today include Black-backed Butcherbird, Rufous-throated, Rufous-banded and Yellow-tinted Honeyeater. We will also spend time searching for the elusive and rare Red Goshawk in the savannah woodlands as they hunt their main source of prey, the prolific Rainbow Lorikeets.

Tonight we will go spotlighting where we should pick up some great birds including Papuan Frogmouth, Eastern Barn Owl and with a bit of luck, Barking Owl and Australasian Grass Owl.

Day 5: 8 July 2028

Musgrave to Daintree area

We depart early to go birding in the northern sections of the Lakefield region, searching for two major targets: the beautiful and very restricted Golden-shouldered Parrot and the rare Red Goshawk. Both species will take some time to track down. Other good birds we'll come across include Rufous-throated and Rufous-banded Honeyeater, Star Finch, Black-breasted Buzzard and Black-necked Stork. After lunch we swap the dry sclerophyll forests of the Peninsula for the cool, dense tropical mountain forest of Mt Lewis. Here we'll be targeting the elusive Fernwren and Blue-faced Parrotfinch, before heading down to the palm-fringed coast of Mossman in preparation for our explorations of the Daintree River and rainforest tomorrow.

Day 6: 9 July 2028

Daintree river to Tablelands

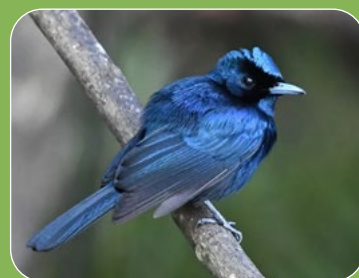
This morning we'll take the "Daintree Eco Cruise" which should be a highlight of the trip, to see Estuarine Crocodile and birds including Papuan Frogmouth, Azure and Little Kingfisher, Black Bittern, Radjah Shelduck, Double-eyed Fig Parrot, Large-billed Gerygone and a good chance of Great-billed Heron. Birding the areas around the amazing, millions-of-years old Daintree rainforest we'll be looking for Shining Flycatcher, Bar-shouldered Dove, Pacific Koel, Scaly-breasted Lorikeet, Helmeted (Hornbill) Friarbird and Dusky Honeyeater. We'll have another chance of Fernwren and Blue-faced Parrotfinch if needed, before heading into the hinterland of Cairns: the Atherton Tablelands, where we may see Brolga and Sarus Crane. After a delightful days' birding, we will arrive at the Chambers Wildlife Rainforest Lodge, hidden in lush, tropical highland rainforest in the beautiful waterfalls and crater lakes district. The lodge has resident Platypus, Brushturkey mounds, and Tooth-billed Bowerbird bowers as well as a good chance to view Victoria's Riflebird. After dinner we'll look for mammals such as Sugar Gliders, Striped Possums and Bandicoots.

Day 7: 10 July 2028

Atherton Tablelands

We'll visit the spectacular Curtain Fig Tree, where there are regular sightings of Double-eyed Fig Parrot, Wompoo Fruit Dove, Spotted Catbird, White-throated Treecreeper, Lewin's and Macleay's Honeyeater, Large-billed Scrubwren, Mountain Thornbill, Brown Gerygone, Eastern Whipbird, Little and Bower's Shrikethrush, Black-faced, Spectacled and Pied Monarch, Yellow-breasted Boatbill, Pale-yellow and Grey-headed Robin and Metallic Starling. We then head to wonderful Mount Hypipamee. Around the main carpark and picnic area, there is a chance of Golden Bowerbird, particularly in fruiting trees, as well as Southern Cassowary, Tooth-billed Bowerbird, Spotted Catbird, Lewin's and Bridled Honeyeater and the rainforest specialists: Fernwren, Pacific Emerald Dove, Chowchilla, Brown Gerygone, Atherton and Yellow-throated Scrubwren, Pale yellow Robin and Mountain Thornbill. Other likely birds include Australian Brushturkey, Orange-footed Scrubfowl, Superb and Wompoo Fruit Dove, Double-eyed Fig Parrot, Australasian Figbird, Black Butcherbird, Green Oriole and Noisy Pitta, amongst others. Later in the afternoon we bird the tropical gardens and streamside forests in the vicinity of the Chambers Wildlife Lodge which is set in lush tropical surroundings and caters exclusively to naturalists and birdwatchers. It is

a tremendous birding area, and the perfect base for birding the wider district. After dark we will do some spotlighting for Tree Kangaroo, owls and nightjars.

Overnight: Chambers Wildlife Lodge, Yungaburra, en-suite rooms
Meals included: B, L, D

Day 8: 11 July 2028

Tablelands to Cairns

We spend the morning birding and photographing the wonderful grounds of the lodge and its surrounding areas of farmland, creeks, woodland and rainforest with an array of tropical bird species. Within the lodge grounds we may see Victoria's Riflebird and Spotted Catbird on the feeders, and Wompoo and Superb Fruit Dove, Scaly-breasted Lorikeet, Topknot Pigeon, Pacific Emerald Dove, Tooth-billed Bowerbird, Atherton Scrubwren, White-throated Treecreeper, Macleay's and Bridled Honeyeater, Yellow-breasted Boatbill, Spectacled and Black-faced Monarchs are all resident. At night, we may find Sooty Owl, and mammals such as Long-nosed Bandicoot, Sugar Glider, Northern Striped Possum and Red-necked Wallaby. We should see the impressive bowers of Golden Bowerbird. In the afternoon we'll bird our way towards Cairns to visit the foreshore with mangroves and coastal mudflats to look for Shining Flycatcher, Mangrove Robin, Large-billed Gerygone, Torresian Kingfisher, Little Heron, Varied Honeyeater and Sahul Sun-bird. We should also see Rainbow and Scaly-breasted Lorikeet, Torresian Imperial Pigeon, Australian Swiftlet, Spangled Drongo and Australasian Figbird.

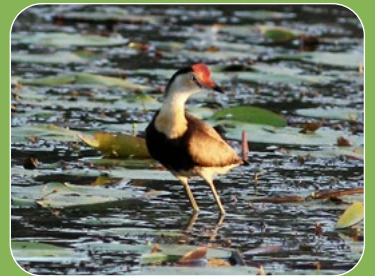
Overnight: Bay Village Tropical Retreat, Cairns, en-suite room

Day 9: 12 July 2028

Final morning in Cairns

The tropical habitats surrounding Cairns contain some of Australia's richest bird- and wildlife. One of the main targets of the morning will be the endangered Southern Cassowary. This large, flightless, dinosaur-like creature can be surprisingly elusive! While looking for it, we should also encounter Black-faced Monarch, Graceful and Yellow-spotted Honeyeater, Green Pygmy Goose, White-browed Crake and more. At lunch back in Cairns we'll check the mudflats off the Esplanade for waders, and then it is time to say goodbye to your guide! You are free to travel home or onwards any time this afternoon. Please liaise with us regarding flight times before booking onward travel out of Cairns.

LEADERS

Bellbird Tour Leader

DIFFICULTY

Low to medium level of fitness required. The tour has a relaxed pace, and walks are on varying surfaces, from paved roads to sandy or rocky walking trails with some short climbs. We generally walk slowly, with lots of stops. You can opt out of any challenging walks.

ACCOMMODATION

Private en-suite rooms in most hotels or lodges. Standards of the lodgings are generally very comfortable. The lodge at Lockhart River has individual rooms, some with en-suite bathroom, some with bathrooms shared between 2-3 people. Expect slow, if any, wi-fi access and little to no mobile phone reception.

CLOTHING

Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt, over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary, including a jumper / sweater and a wind- and rain-proof jacket.

WHAT TO BRING

Please travel light. Binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors if you're an international guest, insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, sun hat, water bottle, hand sanitizer. Sturdy footwear recommended. Scopes, super-telephoto lenses with tripods, and heavy suitcases are discouraged. For Iron Range-Cairns flight total luggage allowance 20kg max. plus max. 7 kg carry-on.
