

Western SA Splits & Specialties

20 - 28 October 2027

As a result of the recent splits of some of Australia's western specialties, we are once again offering our *Western SA Splits & Specialties Tour*. Starting in and returning to Adelaide, this tour traverses much of South Australia's West Coast, the northern Eyre Peninsula and Nullarbor Plain towards the Western Australian border. This is a fast-paced trip, as we'll cover some 3000 km in eight days.

Focusing on the main targets of Copperback and Nullarbor Quail-thrush, Naretha Bluebonnet, Sandhill Grasswren and Western (White-bellied) Whipbird, we will also look for Western Grass-

wren, Western Whistler and Spotted Scrubwren. Other species we will target include Western Yellow Robin, Blue-breasted Fairywren, Rufous Treecreeper, Rock Parrot and the western subspecies of Gilbert's Whistler and Pink Cockatoo. A recent addition to the tour itinerary is the newly split Sandhill Grasswren.

Another not-to-be-missed aspect of this tour will be the amazing coastal scenery of the Great Australian Bight. We'll be running this tour during the Austral spring, generally a great time to go birding in this part of the world. There are only limited seats available on this small-group tour.

ITINERARY

Day 0: 20 October 2027

Arrival in Adelaide and flight to Ceduna

Please make your own arrangements to arrive in Adelaide before your flight (included) to Ceduna today, where you'll be collected from the plane. We'll meet for dinner and introductions this evening.

Overnight: East-West Motel Ceduna, en-suite motel rooms

Day 1: 21 October 2027

Exploring the 'mallee'

We'll spend a full day birding the remote 'mallee' eucalypt bush north of Ceduna, where the main targets are the elusive but subtly beautiful Copperback Quail-thrush and the cryptic Sandhill Grasswren. We'll travel for a few hours on rough, sandy outback tracks to reach a remote location for this elusive species. Other good birds we can find here include Western Yellow Robin, Mulga Parrot, Shy Heathwren, Gilbert's Whistler and Southern Scrub Robin. After a picnic lunch at a scenic spot we'll head back to civilisation.

Overnight: East-West Motel Ceduna, en-suite motel rooms

Day 2: 22 October 2027

Nullarbor Plain

We'll have an early departure this morning as we travel further west to the Nullarbor plain, Australia's largest treeless plain, where the main focus of the morning will be Nullarbor Quail-thrush. These birds inhabit the vast, treeless bluebush prairie and can be hard to spot as they feed inconspicuously on the ground. After lunch at the Nullarbor Roadhouse we head even further west to a site for Naretha Bluebonnet (recently split from Bluebonnet). Smaller and more colourful than the original Bluebonnets, the elusive Narethas inhabit sparsely treed areas away from the road. At the end of the day we return to the Nullarbor Roadhouse.

Day 3: 23 October 2027

Fowlers Bay

Before breakfast we'll explore the outback north of the Roadhouse for Nullarbor Quail-thrush. Other species we could encounter are Red-throat, Inland Dotterel and we will be on the lookout for Australian Bustard. After breakfast we have a backup morning for Naretha Bluebonnet or we'll bird some more in the area before starting the journey east again, aiming to pick up anything we may have missed. We'll call in at very scenic Fowlers Bay with its unique sand dunes and beach where Sanderling, Ruddy Turnstone, Sharp-tailed Sandpiper, Red-necked Stint and White-bellied Sea-eagle can be seen.

Overnight: Ceduna Foreshore Motel, en-suite motel rooms

Day 4: 24 October 2027

South to Port Lincoln

A few hours in the morning will be spent searching for Copperback Quail-thrush, should we still need it; otherwise this will be a back-up morning for anything we may have missed previously, or there is time for a relaxed morning birding various local coastal spots while working our way south. After arriving in Port Lincoln and time permitting, we'll check out the nearby national park to familiarise ourselves with the local birdlife.

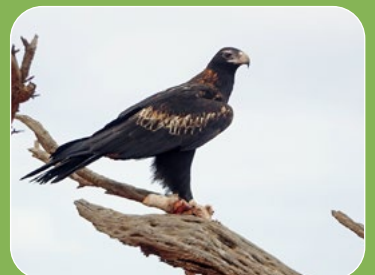
Day 5: 25 October 2027

Port Lincoln

We'll spend the entire day birding the vast wilderness surrounding Port Lincoln for a good chance of Western (White-bellied) Whipbird. These birds are extremely elusive and while they're readily heard singing, obtaining views of them in the dense, tall scrub is going to be a challenge. Therefore, we allocate two mornings to this bird. This is a very scenic area which contains eucalypt scrub and woodlands, saltwater lakes, natural clearings, and a beautiful rocky coastline with sandy coves. Many other good species await us today, including Eastern Osprey, Sooty Oystercatcher, Hooded Plover, Southern Scrub Robin, Purple-gaped and Tawny-crowned Honeyeater, Western Yellow Robin, Blue-breasted Fairywren, Spotted Scrubwren and Rock Parrot.

Overnight: Port Lincoln Hilton Motel, en-suite motel rooms

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 6: 26 October 2027
Along the Eyre Peninsula to Kimba

Our last chance for Western (White-bellied) Whipbird this morning or to pick up any other species we may still need. We'll then follow the west coast of the Eyre Peninsula to the town of Kimba located on the edge of another vast 'mallee' wilderness area. Along the way we check the coastal mudflats and mangroves from the boardwalk at Elliston, where we may come across Slender-billed Thornbill, Fairy Tern, Spotted Scrubwren and dolphins.

Overnight: Kimba Hotel Motel, en-suite motel rooms

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 7: 27 October 2027
Lake Gilles to Port Augusta

We'll make an early departure to watch the sun rise in the bush around Lake Gilles, a beautiful and underexplored area of South Australia where birds of the South Australian outback join their Western Australian counterparts. Patches of woodland hold Rufous Treecreeper, Western Yellow Robin, Pied Honeyeater, Elegant Parrot, Hooded Robin, White-fronted Honeyeater, Black-eared Cuckoo and on shrubby flats Slender-billed Thornbill, Orange, Crimson & White-fronted Chat. We'll check the bluebush plains for Western Grasswren (former myall race of Thick-billed) and other good birds we may encounter today include White-winged Fairywren, Spotted Scrubwren, Redthroat, Greater Bluebonnet and Mulga Parrot. We also have further chances of Copperback Quail-thrush and with luck, Pink Cockatoo.

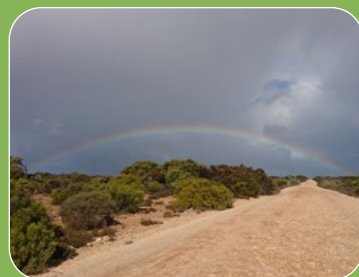
Overnight: Standpipe Motel Port Augusta, en-suite motel rooms

Meals included: B, L, D

Day 8: 28 October 2027
Return to Adelaide and departure

This morning, we have a look for Western Grasswren before we travel south, following the coastal mudflats and mangroves birding for Slender-billed Thornbill, Elegant Parrot, Banded Stilt, Chirruping Wedgebill and other local species. We'll visit the Arid Lands Botanical Gardens in Port Augusta with chances of Pied and Black Honeyeater. Returning to Adelaide mid-afternoon, we finalise the bird list and drop you at the airport for your flight home (own arrangements: please don't book flights departing before 6pm), or at a hotel nearby (own arrangements).

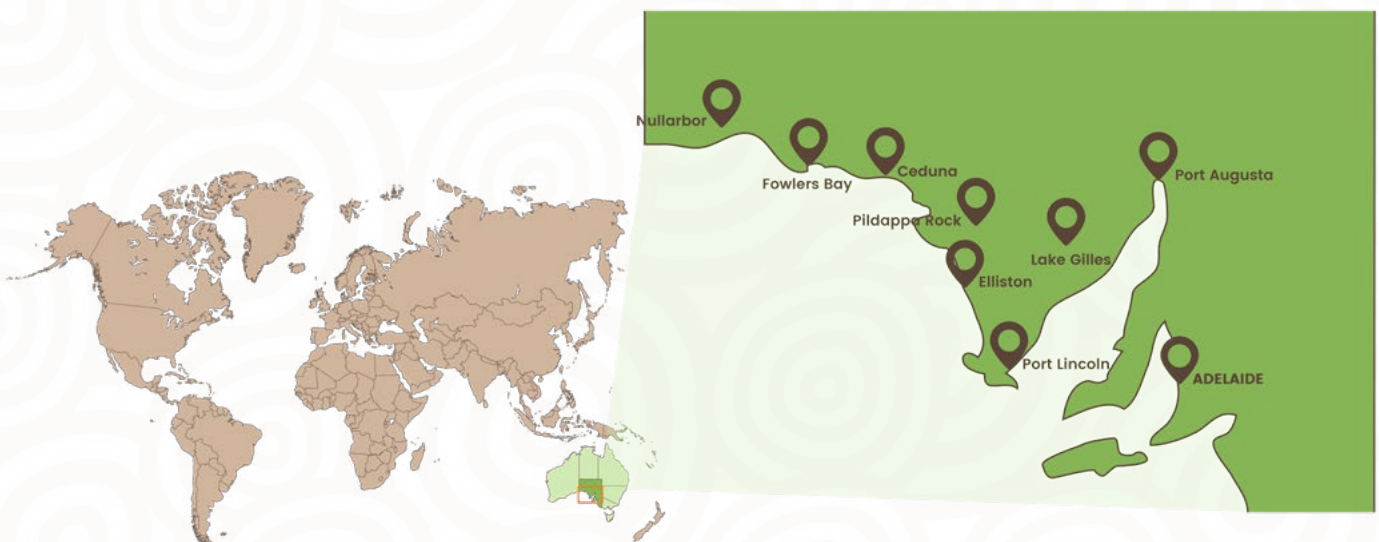

PRACTICAL DETAILS

LEADERS

Peter Waanders or other local SA guide.

DIFFICULTY

Low to medium level of fitness required. The tour has a reasonable pace and walks are on varying surfaces, from paved roads to uneven, gravelly trails with some short climbs and soft sandy dunes. We generally walk slowly, with lots of stops. You can opt out of any challenging walks.

ACCOMMODATION

Private en-suite rooms in hotels or motels. Standards of the lodgings are generally very comfortable. Expect slow, if any, wi-fi access.

CLOTHING

Lightweight long pants, t-shirt and long-sleeved shirt, over the top of which you can wear layers that can be taken off as necessary, including a rain-proof jacket. Neat casual attire for dinners. Shorts and sandals or 'thongs' (flip-flops) are acceptable for non-birding time.

WHAT TO BRING

Please travel light, as there is a 15 kg max check-in luggage on the flight from Adelaide to Ceduna. Binoculars, camera, mobile phone, chargers, power adaptors if you're an international visitor, insect repellent, sunscreen, personal medications, travel umbrella, hat, water bottle, hand sanitiser. Sturdy footwear recommended. Scopes, super-telephoto lenses with tripods, and heavy suitcases are discouraged.
